

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD
SUNDAY 10th January AD 2016



Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Baptism of Our Lord. In the modern calendar this concludes the holy season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves," He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world."



Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid the occasions of sin.

Large Print Orders of Service are available at St Mary & St Giles. Please ask a Sidesman or Sideswoman for a copy.




A Loop System is in operation at St Mary & St Giles please set hearing aids to the "T" position.




Access for the Disabled at St Mary & St Giles is via the path on the north side of the church. At All Saints it is via the South Porch.

VERY IMPORTANT - Sound System: It is really important that the sound system at St Mary & St Giles is operated each week, but for this to happen we need volunteers to be trained in its use. Please have a word with the Rector or Churchwardens if you would be willing to be part of a rota of volunteers who manage this during the Parish Mass on Sundays and Feast Days. Thank you.

Scripture Readers at Mass and the Offertory bearers: as a parish family we are hugely grateful to all those who take part each week in various ways in the Liturgy. With the need for the Rector to spend some time at the back of church after Mass before needing to leave for the 11:00am Mass at All Saints it would be really helpful if we could ensure that the Mass runs more to time. If Scripture readers could be at the Lectern at the start of the preceding item of the reading they have been asked to read that would be really helpful - so the First Reader should be at the Lectern as the Collect commences and the Second Reader should be at the Lectern as the Psalm commenc-

In order that the altar can be prepared at the Offertory without undue delay could those responsible for bringing up the Gifts of Bread and Wine each week please ensure that this is done during the first verse of the Offertory hymn. The alms may be brought up towards the end of the hymn as they take time to collect. Thank you.

Tuesday 12th January - Parish Diary Planning Meeting: Would all those who need to book dates in the Parish Diary for the remainder of the year (and make advance bookings for 2017), please come to the Rectory this Tuesday (12th) at 7:30pm in order that we can ensure that everything is planned as much as possible. Seating at St Mary & St Giles: the overwhelming choice over whether to have a cushioned seat pad or a sea-grass seat, following the great 'Sit down and Try Out' is that we should have them with cushioned seat pads.

As previously reported the PCC is committed to seeing the disabled access project completed first. One or two people have asked whether we could decorate the church before doing anything else. While that is understandable, it should be borne in mind that it makes sense to do all the structural work first, otherwise it means decorating twice (and the cost of decorating the church is very, very expensive).

Similarly, there are two very good reasons for replacing

the seating before decorating and they are: a) because it is important that you are able to sit in comfort; and more importantly b) because all the present seating is infected with woodworm and we need to replace it as soon as is possible otherwise we run the risk of woodworm infecting the structural woodwork in the building. The cost of such an infestation would be ruinous.

Once the faculty is granted for the current works, we shall be launching a grant seeking and fundraising effort. A number of people have asked if they can donate chairs in memory of loved ones to which the answer is, "Yes, and that is very generous of you."

The Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches has visited St Mary & St Giles and considered our proposals. At its subsequent meeting it recommended approval. We now await the receipt of the faculty, although there will be a slight delay due to the disabled access part of the proposals requiring a modest repositioning of two ledgers in the floor of the tower area. The Chancellor has asked for a little more information, but as these are not being removed, but kept adjacent to their present position, this is a minor part of the faculty application. By repositioning them they will still be visible rather than the new interior doors obscuring part of them.

Lent, Holy Week & Easter 2016

- To pray for the living and the dead.


are an ancient and proven Lenten discipline to aid progress in the spiritual life and draw us closer to Christ.

In the meantime, there are just over four weeks left to return your Palm Crosses from last Palm Sunday in order that they can be burnt to make ashes for use on Ash Wednesday.

From one of Father Stanton's Last Sermons in S. Alban's, Holborn

"Never you be ashamed of the Blood of Christ. I know it is not the popular religion of the day. They will call out 'mediævalism', but you know as well as possible that the whole Bible from cover to cover is incriminated, reddened with the Blood of Christ. Never you be ashamed of the Blood of Christ. You are Bloodbought Christians. It is the song of the redeemed, of the saints, and of all Christians on earth—redeemed by His Blood. You never be ashamed of it. The uniform we Christians wear is scarlet. If you are ashamed of the uniform, for goodness' sake, man, leave the service. Oh! never be ashamed of Christ! That is the song of the redeemed: 'To Him be glory and praise for ever, Amen.' And the second thing is this: Let us all remember that our religion is the religion of a personal Saviour. It is not a system of ethics, it is not a scheme of philosophy, it is not a conclusion of science, but it is personal love to a personal living Saviour—that is our religion! Why, when you can hear the voice of Christ off the altar to-day at Mass, 'DO this in memory of Me.' 'You' and 'Me.' He 'Christ'—"me"—memory'—'Don't forget Me here at the Altar' our Lord says to you—'I will never forget you—don't you ever forget Me.' 'Do this in memory of Me.' It is a personal religion, by which we can say, 'He loved me, and gave Himself for me'—'The life which I now live in the flesh, I live by faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me.' And then, in all your experiences, however deep they may be, when you enter into the shadow of death, and go through the agony of the dissolution of your body—you can say: 'He loved me, and gave Himself for me.' He loved me and washed me from my sins His Blood, to Him be glory and dominion and praise henceforth for ever, Amen."
