Reflection prior to Mass

Today's Gospel is the famous story of the prodigal son. Not only the son is prodigal, however. 'Prodigal' means 'wasteful' or 'lavish, spendthrift,' and when we think about it, we can see that it is also the Father who is prodigal, lavishing his love on us no matter what we do. This theme of God's loving mercy runs through all of today's readings.





Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread"


God does not need us to make his existence happy. He is all-powerful, all-perfect, all-happy in himself. Because He is a God of love, a God of infinite generosity, He wants to give us a share in His happiness. At times one must wonder how anyone who knows of God's generosity and of what that generosity has led Him to do for us, could ever think of abandoning that loving God, or get lost in futile earthly folly. Yet that does happen when we sin grievously.

God does not cast us out forever as sinners unworthy of His gifts. Instead, He foresees such folly on our part, and has left us lessons of encouragement, as in today's parables, and set up in the Church ways and means to carry on His work of mercy for weak, mortal people. During His life on earth, Christ dealt mostly with sinners - he said he came to save the lost sheep of the house of Israel. He told the Pharisees that it was the sick who needed a doctor, not those who were well. The Pharisees in their pride thought they were not sick but they were, and He was ready to heal them if only they would let Him.

He spent his days then among sinners, the tax-gatherers, the robbers, the adulterers, the usurers. The twelve men He chose from amongst His followers had more than their share of human failings. We are all sinners to a greater or lesser degree. With this knowledge and conviction, which any true Christian must have, of the infinite mercy of God, no sinner need ever, and should never, despair. No sinner was ever lost and no sinner will ever be lost, because of his sins. Sinners are lost only because they will not trust and believe in God's mercy and turn to Him to ask for pardon.

Our merciful Father calls to us His erring children to return to his household. Today, one of those calls is in the very words of the parables we hear.

There may be another call for the sinners amongst us. There may not. Heed this one and the other call will not be necessary. Turn to God today with a truly contrite heart. God will do the rest.

Gluten-Free Hosts: if you are on a Gluten-Free diet and would like a Gluten-Free Host when you receive Holy Communion please mention this before Mass to one of the Sidesmen who will arrange this for you. Please make yourself known to the Parish Priest so that he is aware of your need.



Collections: for the continuing mission of Christ are taken while the altar and gifts of bread and wine are being prepared. Retirement: after considerable prayer and thought our Organist, John Neal, has decided that it is time for him to retire. John has kindly given the Rector an assurance that he will serve three months notice and so his final Sunday will be on the 30th October which gives us some time to see if we can appoint a new organist and/or choirmaster. Obviously, we will want to mark John's retirement nearer the time.

The PCC is currently advertising for a new organist and your prayers for a suitable person to be appointed are requested.

Confirmation Preparation: the Rector is planning to commence Confirmation Preparation sessions in late September for adults and children. The sessions for those aged 18 and above will be held on Wednesday's in the Parish Hall adjoining St Mary & St Giles following the evening Mass. Please see Fr Ross about these sessions.

With regard to the preparation of young people aged between 10 and 17 the date and time of the sessions will be agreed with a meeting of the parents of all young people. These sessions will be held at the Rectory and parents are asked to liaise with Sister Janet.

Fr Ross has a tentative date for the Confirmation in 2017 for the 2nd February. The Feast of Candlemass, in All Saints. This will be the first Confirmation Service in All Saints for about half a century, and will therefore, be a very special occasion and a visible sign of the growth in worshipping numbers there.

Children's Activity Morning at St Mary & St Giles: All children are most welcome to join us at 9.30am on Wednesday, 31st August for a morning of fun activities, using The Lord's Prayer as our theme. PARISH NEWS AND NOTICES

Sidesmen: The Churchwardens ask that all sidesmen check the rota on the notice board at the back of church to see when they are on duty.

Church Library: Sidney Chambers is back! We now have two more books in the light-hearted Grantchester series, so join the clerical detective as he balances police work, matrimony and the parish with his own soul-searching. Also new to us are "In the footsteps of St Paul", by presenter Edward Stourton, which should be interesting, and "The History of Ancient Israel" by Michael Grant including modern implications. These and many more excellent books are all for borrowing from the Church Library.

Church Diaries: the 2017 diaries are now available. We were approached by a new supplier who not only produce a diary with a beautiful cover but also provided us with a much greater quantity than the previous supplier, who had been reducing the quantity it was allowing us over a number of years. These cost the church nothing and as we have such a good supply you can take them and give to friends and relations. They are obviously proving popular as about half of them have been taken already, which is a good thing.

Trees at St Mary & St Giles: the PCC has received planning consent from Milton Keynes Council to fell the six Lime Trees in the churchyard, all of which are diseased. Two will be felled each year for the next three years. The Council has also granted us permission to fell the enormous fir tree which overhangs the newsagents and the apartments behind it. The felling of this tree will bring a lot more natural light into the parish church, as well as preventing damage to the neighbouring properties. The remaining are all permitted to be 'crown-reduced' by 50% at 10% per year over five years.

As part of these agreed works the large bough protruding from the side of the huge redwood outside the west door will also be removed, so as to balance the tree. This tree is a cause for concern as it ought never to have been planted so close to the church tower and is still relatively quite young and could potentially double in height. To gain some perspective on the height redwoods can reach it is worth looking at the one in All Saints Churchyard which is almost at its full height. It ought also to be noted that such specimens are essentially a softwood and in high winds at All Saints the tree can be seen acting rather like a whip as the tree bends in the wind and then springs back as far in the opposite direction (and then back and forth) when there is a lull in the wind. So the specimen in St Mary & St Giles churchyard will need to be monitored, especially with regard to its effect on the church tower given that the prevailing wind is westerly.

The PCC now has to obtain Faculty Consent from the Chancellor of the Diocese, and that application has been submitted. It is hoped that a decision will be reached by late autumn, so that works can commence this year and the felling be complete by 2018 and the entire works complete by 2020.

Four Prayers by Dr Edward Bouverie Pusey: Dr Pusey was a very great theologian and Biblical scholar. Yet a lot of what he wrote and preached is characterised by simplicity and depth, revealing so much about him as a person, as a Christian and as a spiritual guide. He Celebrated Mass and Preached at All Saints in the 1830's and 1840's as the Tractarian Movement began.
