THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

22nd January AD 2017

The Gospel presents Jesus as the Light who was promised to dispel the darkness of sin and to free man from the obscurity in which he is enclosed. God manifests Himself as 'The Light' that disperses the darkness. The light illuminates, encircles, defines things, emphasises the colours and gives depth to space. The light heartens and comforts: to be in an enlightened place helps us to accept reality for what it is and makes one feel happier, more certain and protected.

God's initiative with regard to us permits us to have a renewed relationship with reality. In God's light everything assumes a new significance, its authentic and definitive meaning. A light which illuminates gives strength and permits the disclosure of the universe and man. This is why, after saying, 'those who dwell in a land of deep darkness on them has light shined' (Is 9:1), the text adds, 'you have increased its joy' (Is 9:2).....a joy and happiness that became real in Jesus' presence. He is the promised light that has come into our midst, His physical presence that expresses the definitive arrival of the Light. The light that shines brightly marks God's initiative performing His first merciful and free step towards a wounded humanity.

This dynamic is expressed through Jesus call of the first Apostles. He chooses them with an unequivocal call, 'Follow Me'. Faced with God's sudden interruption in their lives He invited them to abandon the nets and trust themselves totally to the Lord for a new 'catch', a new definitive horizon. At the Last Supper, the end of His earthly life, Jesus reminds His disciples 'you did not choose me, no, I chose you' (John 15:16). This Sunday's Gospel invites us to remember that our personal vocation is founded on God's original and absolutely free choice. His invitation towards us, therefore, is an invitation to make a final decision to let Him conquer or re-conquer us to mark a turning point in our lives.



Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

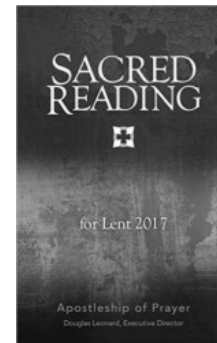

The Rector's recommended Lenten Companion/Book



This powerful Lenten prayer book from the Apostleship of Prayer engages and inspires readers with the Church's daily scripture readings from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday, introducing Christians to the traditional spiritual devotion known as lectio divina, or "sacred reading", in a new way.

The cost per copy is £2.99, and orders may be placed with the Rector up to Sunday 5th February to ensure delivery by the beginning of Lent - Ash Wednesday is on the 1st March this year.

The condition of the exterior noticeboard had been discussed previously and the Rectors request of MK Planning Officers that they recommend a material that would last longer than wood had been promised, but not forthcoming. The Rector agreed to approach the planning officers once more, and at the same time to seek agreement for the introduction of a noticeboard at All Saints.

The Rector reported on meetings with the Deanery Pastoral Committee and the Archdeacon with regard to a Mission Priest being appointed. While finance for the post was an issue both the Archdeacon and he had agreed that for the CofE not to make an appointment would show the Diocese in a poor light, given that we have the largest single development within the UK being built entirely within the boundaries of the parish.

Mr Salter regularly keeps the PCC updated on the work of our Church School. His report this time concentrated on the way in which the expansion of the school onto two sites was progressing now that it had become a reality. He asks the prayers of everyone for the successful future of the whole school. It was agreed that the next meeting of the PC would be held in the south site of the School (Galley Hill).

The Rector reported on the situation regarding 'Rough Sleepers.' Contrary to certain reports on social media, no one was actually sleeping in the lychgate overnight at the moment. Bedding has been observed under one of the benches, but this appears to have been used in the earlier parts of the evenings as an opportunity to elicit sympathy from others who might offer cash. The Rector, Churchwardens and PCC Members all agreed that they wished that people would not give rough sleepers money as it only helps to foster the addictions that they so often have.

Mr Williams had kindly installed

some coat hooks in the Parish Hall, which were very generously paid for by the Fellowship. The PCC agreed that it would be very useful to have a similar set of coat hooks on the wall opposite the toilets in the lobby area.

While the Rector's sabbatical had been delayed until 2018, the PCC were pleased to learn that the Bishops had encouraged the Rector to take four weeks leave this year for a period of concentrated study. He anticipates that this will not take place until after Pentecost.

The Rector was delighted to conclude the meeting by reporting on a meeting he had had that morning which was a follow up meeting to a meeting held last year with regard to the expansion of almshouses in the parish with an Officer of MK Council. On the western expansion area there are a number of sites which are 'reserved' for social use and two of these areas have been identified as being used for 'supported housing.' The Calverton Almshouses Association has been encouraged to look to expand its provision of properties, and so the Rector had approached the Council about these two areas of land in 2015. Following that he had compiled a comprehensive report to the Council identifying how the Almshouses Association might fulfil the Council's criteria and qualify as the housing provider on the land. At Thursday's meeting the Council's Officer had confirmed that the proposals 'had traction' with the Council and that we should now progress to the next stage of the charity seeking funds from the various agencies that will provide loans (the rental income would repay the loans), and the Council will begin to liaise with developers on the release of two plots of land and draw up some initial designs. The PCC was thrilled to learn that, when realised, this will provide 30 new Almshouses - all of which are not subject to the 'Right to Buy' legislation, and therefore remain social housing.

The Bishop will be Confirming at All Saints when we observe Candlemass, at 7:30pm on 1st February 2017.

We have four adults and two young people preparing for Confirmation. This will be a really special occasion for them and I hope that as many of us as possible will make every effort to support them with our presence at Mass in All Saints on this day.

This is also the first Confirmation to have been held in All Saints for at least 55 years, and is a real sign of the recent growth in the worshipping community.

As is our custom there will be a reception held afterwards in church and Diane West, Ann Westley and Joyce Todd amongst others would be very grateful to receive offers of savoury and sweet finger food.

Next Lunchtime Concert: will be performed at 12:30pm in St Mary & St Giles Church on Thursday 16th February. All are very welcome to this free concert. Hot drinks are provided and everyone is free to bring a packed lunch if they wish to do so.

Parochial Church Council News: the PCC met on Thursday evening of last week. Amongst the matters discussed and decided were:

To apply for a faculty for ventilation in the wood panelling in the Church at All Saints to help prevent damp, and to install a 'French Drain' on the south side of the church.

At SMSG to replace the flood-lighting (as the current system is not working and exorbitant to run even if repaired) hoping that funding might come in through grants and donations.

The PCC was delighted with the works undertaken to the trees at SMSG, and agreed to submit the application for the next round of agreed works which will include the removal of remaining limes and 10% crown reduction of most of the remaining trees. Concern was expressed as to potential of damage to the tower in the medium to long term by the close proximity of the Wellingtonia.

It was agreed that to have made a profit of almost £1000 on the Grand Draw given the short space of time to sell tickets was a tribute to those who had worked so hard to sell tickets. It was further agreed that in future there would be one Grand Draw per annum with tick-

ets on sale from June 1st through to the draw in December, thus increasing the potential for greater profit and a less frenetic pressure to sell tickets.

The Rector reported on the handover meeting between Mr Limentani, our former architect (who has now retired) and Mrs Finlay who has been appointed by the PCC. The meeting took place at the Rectory with all files and drawings being transferred to Mrs Finlay.

The PCC agreed that as well as each Parish Church having a 'Scrubology Day' each year, it would be very helpful to have a working party once a year for each church to help with general maintenance works with regard to the exterior of our churches and the churchyards. Churchwardens will set dates in agreement with others who are involved in practical ways.

The Treasurer went through the end of year financial position and the 'draft' accounts for 2016. There was a shortfall on budgeted 'Planned Giving' of £700, but he was pleased that this was less of a shortfall than in 2015, and was able to report that we were able to pay £35,000 in Parish Share in 2016 - an increase of £1000 on the previous year. Considerable discussion took place about the Parish Share, Diocesan and Deanery requests for greater levels of giving, Gift Aid along with how we might usefully use the 'Giving in Grace' initiative. The matter of the real risk of not having a full-time priest in the future, should be the Parish Share not be paid in full, was raised and acknowledged. It was stressed that we never refuse to pay in full but are unable to at present. The 2017 Parish Share has been set by the Deanery as £60,000 for our Parish.

A report of the work of the Mission Visiting Teams and the next round of visits was made.
