Today the Church celebrates the Birth of Jesus Christ, the first day in the octave of Christmas. Throughout Advent the Church longed ardently for the coming of our Saviour. Today she celebrates His birth with unrestrained joy. "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us." The Son of God became man to give us a share in that divine life which is eternally His in the Blessed Trinity. Christmas time begins on December 24 with the first Vespers of the feast and ends on the feast of the Baptism of Christ. White vestments reappear in our churches as a sign that the Christmas feast is a festival full of joy.

The Eternal Word has become Man and dwells among us. The longings of the patriarchs and prophets are fulfilled. With the shepherds we hurry to the manger and adore the Incarnate Son of God, who for us and for our salvation descended upon earth. The purpose of the Christmas feast is beautifully expressed in the Preface of the Nativity: "For by the mystery of the Word made flesh the light of Thy glory hath shone anew upon the eyes of our mind; so that while we acknowledge Him a God seen by men, we may be drawn by Him to the love of things unseen."

A Loop System is in operation at St Mary & St Giles - please set hearing aids to the "T" position.

Access for the Disabled at St Mary & St Giles is via the path on the north side of the church. At All Saints it is via the South Porch.

Gluten-Free Hosts: if you are on a Gluten-Free diet and would like a Gluten-Free Host when you receive Holy Communion please mention this before Mass to one of the Sides men or women who will arrange this for you. Please make yourself known to

the Parish Priest so that he is aware of your need.

Collections: for the continuing mission of Christ are taken while the altar and gifts of bread and wine are being prepared. Prayer after Communion (STAND)

Let us pray.

The Blessing of the Christmas Crib

The priest, accompanied by the servers, takes the figure of the Infant Christ from the altar (where it represented the link between his coming to us in Bethlehem - the House of Bread and his coming to us now in the Eucharist under the veils of bread and wine) and places it in the crib. The crib is then blessed.

Let us ask for God's blessing on this Christmas manger and upon ourselves, that we who reflect on the birth of Jesus may share in the salvation he accomplished.

O God of every nation and people, from the very beginning of creation you have made manifest your love: when our need for a Saviour was great you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary.

To our lives he brings joy and peace, justice, mercy, and love.

Lord, bless, & hallow and consecrate this manger, and all who look upon it; may it remind us of the humble birth of Jesus, and raise up our thoughts to him,

who is God-with-us and Saviour of all, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lighting of the Christ Candle

The priest invites a child to light the Christ Candle on the Advent Wreath, and then leads the people in prayer:

Blessed are you, Sovereign Lord, King of Peace: to you be praise and glory for ever! The new light of your incarnate Word gives gladness in our sorrow, and a presence in our isolation. Fill our lives with your light, until they overflow with gladness and praise.

the messenger running along the mountain ridges proclaiming the news of their deliverance. The same note of joy runs through the entire reading, which here refers to much more than the return of Jewish exiles to Jerusalem. It is a poem of joy for our redemption.

The priest shows the consecrated Host to the people, saying:

The Choir sing an Anthem following which Carols are sung quietly as the people reverently receive Holy Communion.

Of the Father's love begotten, ere the worlds began to be, he is Alpha and Omega, he the source, the ending he, of the things that are, that have been, and that future years shall see, evermore and evermore!

By his word was all created; he commanded; it was done: heaven and earth and depths of ocean universe of three in one, all that grows beneath the shining of the light of moon and sun, evermore and evermore!

Blessed was the day for ever when the Virgin, full of grace, by the Holy Ghost conceiving, bore the Saviour of our race; and the Child, the world's Redeemer, first revealed his sacred face, evermore and evermore!

O ye heights of heaven, adore him; angels and archangels sing!

Every creature bow before him singing praise to God our King; let no earthly tongue be silent, all the world with homage ring, evermore and evermore!

He, by prophets sung, is here now, promised since the world began, now on earth in flesh descended to atone for sins of man.
All creation praise its Master, see fulfilment of his plan: evermore and evermore.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven.

(on this day it is customary for all those present to genuflect during the next three lines)

by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayer of the Faithful

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

Once in royal David's city stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manger for his bed: Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

He came down to earth from heaven, who is God and Lord of all, and his shelter was a stable, and his cradle was a stall; with the poor, the scorned, the lowly, lived on earth our Saviour holy.

And, through all his wondrous childhood, he would honour and obey, love and watch the lowly maiden in whose gentle arms he lay:
Christian children all must be mild, obedient, good as he.

For he is our childhood's pattern, day by day like us he grew; he was little, weak and helpless, tears and smiles like us he knew. and he feeleth for our sadness, and he shareth in our gladness.

And our eyes at last shall see him, through his own redeeming love; for that Child who seemed so helpless is our Lord in heaven above; and he leads his children on to the place where he is gone.

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing round, we shall see him; but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high; when like stars his children crowned, all in white shall wait around.

Pray brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his Church.

The priest says the Prayer over the Gifts to which all respond: **Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts. **We lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The priest prays the preface in which God is praised for his might works.

All join in the Sanctus & Benedictus (KNEEL) ('Mass of Christ the Saviour' Setting)

Hosanna, hosanna, hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes,

The priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving, recalling the command of Jesus Christ, 'Do this in memory of me.'

Priest: The mystery of faith:

All: We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

The Eucharistic Prayer continues with the priest interceding for the Church, the world, all those present at this celebration, and the Faithful Departed.

At the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer all join in the Great Amen.

Priest:for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

THE COMMUNION RITE

The Lord's Prayer

The priest introduces the Lord's Prayer: (STAND)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**
