REFLECTION - FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

"The Healing of the Man born Blind" - 2 Questions

Some reflections on this morning's Gospel from the Orthodox Churches:

When Christ spat on the ground, and made a paste out of the clay and anointed the blind man's "eyes", He actually created eyes for him. The Orthodox services mention this wondrous detail:

Along the way, our Saviour found / a man who lacked both sight and eyes. / And making clay with His spittle, / the Lord anointed him therewith. / He sent the man to Siloam, that he might go and wash therein. / And having washed as he was told, / O Christ, he came away seeing, / and he beheld Thy divine light.

(Expostilarion, Matins for the Sunday of the Blind Man)

Having, like an abundance of wealth, the form and members which comprise this our mortal flesh, the man who was blind from birth could neither imagine nor think what the form or nature of this world could be; for he also was endowed with a genuine lack of eyes ... (Vespers, Sunday of the Blind man, Lord I have cried, sticheron 2)

The blind man not only had no eyes and had seen no man; he also did not know Christ. Jesus first healed his eyes, and upon meeting him again, healed the eyes of his soul. He who was formerly blind both in his physical eyes and those of his soul now could clearly see out of both. The services for the Sunday of the Blind Man are replete with references to spiritual blindness, and supplication to be delivered from it.

"O Christ God, Thou spiritual Sun of Righteousness, / Who by Thine immaculate touch / didst bestow a two-fold enlightenment upon him / who from his mother's womb was deprived of sight, / illumine Thou the eyes of our souls also, / and prove us to be sons of the day, / that we may cry to Thee with faith: / Great and ineffable is Thy compassion toward us, O Friend of man; // Glory be to Thee."

Aposticha, Vespers for the Blind Man)

"Who can tell of Thy mighty acts, O Christ, / or who can number the multitudes of Thy wonders? / For even as Thou, in Thy goodness, didst appear on earth twofold of nature, / so didst Thou grant twofold healings to the sick; / for Thou didst open not only the bodily eyes of the man / who was blind from the womb, / but those of his soul also. / Wherefore, he confessed Thee, the hidden God, // Who grantest great mercy unto all."

(Glory from the Praises, Matins for the Sunday of the Blind Man)

This Sunday is known as Laetare Sunday and is a Sunday of joy. Lent is half over, and Easter is enticingly near. The Church's liturgy, on this the fourth Sunday of Lent, invites us to retrace one of the fundamental dynamics of our baptismal rebirth through the Gospel account of the healing of the 'man born blind'. It is the passage from the darkness of sin and error to the Light of God, who is the Risen Christ, even though there are those who would prevent it.

This Sunday is called "Laetare Sunday" since its mood and theme is one of hope and rejoicing that Easter was near. This Sunday is not different from the other Sundays of Lent though the entrance antiphon for the day still begins with the Latin word "laetare" and the vestments worn by the celebrant are rose-coloured, not violet.



he could take care of his slowly dying wife. He went through practically all of his savings, fully realizing that he would not have much left for himself in his golden years. But that didn't matter. He lovingly poured his life out for her in her remaining years, serving her, feeding her, bathing her and dressing her. Every day he'd take his wife outside for walks in the neighbourhood. He constantly read to her and talked to her. telling her about the weather, their friends and family, what was happening in the world and her favourite baseball team even though she could not say a single word back.

For years, he never had even one conversation with the love of his life. But he was always by her side, all the way to the end.

Hero of Your Life

The tale of these two couples encapsulates the main contrasts between the classical and relativistic worldviews. Both husbands saw their life story take an unanticipated turn. And at that pivotal moment, one revealed himself to be a hero, while the other walked away from love and his responsibility to his family. One lived a kind of life we might expect an individualistic, relativistic culture to produce. The other rose above the mainstream and reminds us of what true greatness is all about.

His life was not about him — it was about giving himself to others, most especially his wife.

Relativism allows people to justify selfish acts that hurt other people. If there is no right or wrong, then I am free to do whatever I want with my life — no matter what consequences there might be for the poor. the unborn and the people God has placed in my life, whether friends, co-workers, family or, in this case, a dying wife and the kids who will be left behind.

But when we fail to give people a moral compass for their lives and instead train them in the relativistic view of freedom, we shouldn't be surprised when selfish acts like this occur and people get hurt in our culture. For relativism isn't just a bad idea. It wounds people.

The Culture of Relativism:

Relativism isn't just a bad idea. It's ruining people's lives. And if we're going to be successful in motivating others to rise above the relativistic culture, we need to help them see what Pope Francis has observed: "Relativism wounds people."

The ideas at the centre of a relativistic outlook are dangerous. Just as bad math can lead to faulty engineering and unsafe buildings and bridges, moral relativism can cause harmful effects in people's lives, encouraging people to do things that will hurt themselves and others.

We can see this especially in the relativistic culture's view of freedom.

Authentic freedom is the ability to perform actions of high quality. It's for something. If I possess the skills of violin playing, I'm free to play the violin with excellence. If I possess the skills of race-car driving, I'm free to race the car around the track at high speeds.

And if I possess the life skills known as the virtues, I am free to give the best of myself in my relationships and thus find happiness. Virtue gives me the freedom to love other people.

But the modern notion of freedom supporting the relativistic outlook is self-centred. It's simply the ability to make choices. It's merely about being free from anyone controlling me. How one chooses to use his freedom, however, doesn't matter. There are no good or bad choices. It doesn't matter what one chooses; all that matters is that one chooses: "It's my life. I'm free to do whatever I want to do with my life. Don't tell me what to do."

A Tale of Two Marriages

A true story about two married couples who lived in the same neighbourhood at the same time can highlight the world of difference between these two views of freedom. One young couple had been happily married for several years with two children when the wife was diagnosed with terminal cancer. She quickly lost the ability to walk and knew she'd be in a wheelchair for the remainder of her life. This wasn't what her husband was expecting when they got married. The emotional and financial pressure was too much.

He wanted a different kind of life. So, in the middle of her battle with cancer, he left his wife and kids for another woman.

According to the modern view of freedom, we can't say what he did was wrong because that's his choice. There are no right or wrong choices, this mindset says. Maybe you wouldn't do that, but we all should celebrate his freedom: He's free to do whatever he wants. And if he wants to leave his dying wife and kids, that's his free choice.

Just streets away was another couple. The wife was diagnosed with an aggressive form of multiple sclerosis. She also quickly lost mobility and had to be pushed in a wheelchair for the rest of her life. But her situation was more incapacitating. She couldn't bathe herself, clothe herself or feed herself. She couldn't even speak.

Her husband was just hitting his stride in his business, but decided to retire early so that

PARISH NEWS & NOTICES

Vestry Meetings: The Vestry Meetings for the election of Churchwardens take place THIS MORNING at the end of each of our Parish Churches Principal Acts of Worship. Nominations for the Office of Churchwarden require the agreement of the Rector and must have been received prior to the Vestry Meeting. We are permitted to elect two Churchwardens for each of our Parish Churches, all of whom serve as Churchwardens for the whole Parish for the next twelve months.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting: takes place at 12:00noon NEXT Sunday (2nd April) at All Saints Church (this meeting alternates between our two Parish Churches on a bi-annual basis). The Agenda for this year's meeting, along with the Minutes of last year's meeting and the 2015 Annual Report and Accounts will be available following the March Parochial Church Council Meeting - as the PCC has to 'receive' the accounts before the Annual Report and Accounts can be published.

Nomination Forms for election to the Deanery Synod and/or Parochial Church Council are available from the Rector.

The revision of the Electoral Roll: for the Parish is now COMPLETE. The good news is that despite a number of names having to be removed from the Roll due to death or because of moving to other parts of the country we have actually seen an increase in the number on the Roll. There have been new people join us regularly for worship in both churches, but the growth at All Saints has seen the numbers at worship increase three-fold.

Planned Giving - Envelope Scheme: the new sets of envelopes for the next financial year are now available for collection in each of our Parish Church for those who regularly use them. If anyone not

currently giving through the envelope scheme would like to do so please see David Williams, Our Treasurer for further details. Similarly, if anyone would prefer to give by Standing Order, David would be happy to talk this through with you.

The Rector, Churchwardens and PCC are very grateful to everyone who gives to the continuing mission of the Church within our parish. While the amount asked of the Parish by the Diocese continues to rise, it is good to be able to report that in 2016 we were able send £1000 more to the Diocese than we had in 2015. There are leaflets (Giving in Grace) recommended by the Archdeacon in both of our churches to enable us all to prayerfully consider our giving to the mission of the Church *Thank you*.

Coffee morning: to be held on Saturday, 1st April - the from 10am - noon. This will include the Young Christians Stall and Line of Pennies. Donations of any items for sale would be much appreciated. This will be followed by Lent Lunches until 1.30pm and the Duck Race (location to be announced).

This edition is designed to be read over the course of the year for about 15 minutes each day. It includes illustrations, maps, charts, diagrams, a timeline, and devotional articles; which are very useful aids to study and prayer.
