REFLECTION - 3rd SUNDAY OF EASTER

"And their eyes were opened"

It is the first day of the week after the great Jewish feast of the Passover and Jerusalem is trying to return to its normal routine. The shop keepers count their profits and the Temple priests congratulate themselves because they were able to kill the 'Galilean'...

Curtains were closed and lights were dimmed not only due to the celebration of Jerusalem's solemn festival but also because everyone had hope that the man Jesus 'would be the One to redeem Israel' (Lk 24:21). The two disciples from Emmaus are to be found, along their journey, talking to 'Jesus in person', 'but their eyes were prevented from recognising Him' (Lk 24:16).

Why did the Lord not tell the disciples straight away who He was? Indeed, in the dialogue that the liturgy presents to us today, it almost seems that Jesus did all He could to avoid revealing His true identity. Firstly, He pretended not to know what Cleopas and his companion were discussing and then He went on to 'explain to them the passages throughout scriptures that were about Himself (Lk 24:27) but without making direct reference to Himself.

At the end of the journey, 'He made to go on' (Lk 24:28). Jesus didn't want to play games with His disciples, but He sought to educate their hearts, and also ours, so that we won't be 'slow'! In fact, when faced with the Lord's Presence, we find that the heart quickly 'burns' upon hearing His words as we are grateful of the fact that we were freed not by 'gold and silver but by the precious blood of Christ' who is the 'blameless and spotless' lamb (Cfr. 1 Pet 1:19).

The Risen Lord uses so much gentleness with us! He doesn't oblige us to 'believe.' As St Augustine extraordinarily wrote in the opening of his Confessions 'our heart is restless until it rests in you' (St. Augustine, Conf. 1,1,1:PL 32,659-661)

There is still one more detail that calls for our attention and raises many questions: why did the eyes of the disciples open to recognise Jesus whilst they were at table with Him? The Eucharistic context is undeniable. The disciples are at table, the Lord is with them; He took the bread and saying the prayer of benediction, broke it. It was during the last action of the breaking of the bread that the companions recognised Jesus. It was not only the action in itself but finally Cleopas and his friends could see, with their own eyes, the hands pierced by the nails of the passion that until that very movement had remained hidden from them during the long journey on the road.

It was in that very moment in which they recognised the presence of the Crucified One, that He 'disappeared from their sight' whilst their eyes remained fixed on the broken bread, that was left to fall 'onto the altar'. Is it not the same experience that every one of us can have every Sunday? So, 'they set out that instant' (Lk 24:33). They started to understand that death is not the last word on the life of each one of us as we can not be 'held in its power' (Acts 2:24). This is a sign of great hope that gives us wondrous joy! In so much as we journey to Jerusalem — each on his own road, it must often seem long and tiring. However, now with our eyes fully opened it appears that we have the privilege to say to all the world, 'the Lord has indeed risen' (Lk 24:34).



(New Testament Page 101 in the Bibles) Peter blames the Jews for their failure to recognise Jesus as the Messiah, whose miracles were a proof that he had been sent by God. Peter quotes a psalm to show that the resurrection had been foretold in the Old Testament.

The Responsorial Psalm (from Psalm 30) Show us, Lord, the path of life.

Preserve me, God, I take refuge in you. I say to the Lord: 'You are my God.' O Lord, it is you who are my portion and cup; it is you yourself who are my prize. ®

I will bless the Lord who gives me counsel, who even at night directs my heart. I keep the Lord ever in my sight: since he is at my right hand, I shall stand firm.

And so my heart rejoices, my soul is glad; even my body shall rest in safety. For you will not leave my soul among the

nor let your beloved know decay. ®

You will show me the path of life, the fullness of joy in your presence, at your right hand happiness for ever. ®

One such dream is that of a Bosnian Muslim Emina Emlonic who related his experience thus: "I was in the desert alone, lost. As far as the horizon, there was nothing in sight but sand. I felt the sand on my bare feet. Then I saw something extraordinary.

"In the midst of that barrenness. an immense wooden cross emerged from the earth, rising up with sand spilling from it back to earth.

"I felt then a spectator in my own dream, and the sight of the cross gave me neither fear nor joy. But I was a curious [sic] and began moving, almost floating, towards it, the most magnificent ... thing I'd ever seen or imagined. and as I came closer to the cross. I suddenly saw a man walking toward me: a broad-shouldered, long-strided man, with a dark complexion, long hair, and wearing a white robe.

"And just as suddenly I ceased to be a witness to my dream. I was in it, walking toward the man walking toward me. I knew him immediately. He was Jesus. Without knowing why. I fell to my knees. He stood over me and touched my face with his right hand.

Emlonic's dream was deeply personal, just like the other Muslims who were approached by Christ. As he appeared to people throughout the Bible. Christ met each person in a way they could understand and on their level of comfort. Jesus didn't appear in a storm or surrounded by flashing lights - he spoke to Emlonic through sight, touch, and, as is the way of dreams, with knowledge. And one of the common features of those reporting these dreams is that they know who this 'Man in white' is without being told. They just know he is Jesus!

Pray for those encountering Jesus Christ our Lord that they may follow Him and be welcomed into his Body, the Church.

died also during the First World War. The survivors were driven eastward and escaped into Russia. On 29 November 1920, most of Armenia was annexed by the Soviet Union.

It is sometimes said that the issues here were national, political, and ethnic rather than religious, and that the victims therefore do no qualify as martyrs. However, many of the Armenians, when about to be killed, were given the option of saving their lives by converting to Islam. Few did.

These Martyrs are recalled on 24th April but the Observance was omitted this year in England due to the Feast of St George being transferred to the 24th - Sundays of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Eastertide taking precedence over Saints Days.

The Collect for the Armenian Martyrs:

O Almighty God, by whose grace and power thy holy martyrs of Armenia triumphed over suffering and were faithful even unto death: Grant us, who now remember them with thanksgiving, to be so faithful in our witness to thee in this world, that we may receive with them the crown of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Recently realised at the cinema is the historical film *The Promise*, which is about a love triangle that develops between Armenian medical student, Mikael, an American journalist based in Paris, Chris and an Armenian-born woman raised in France, Ana, during the final years of the Ottoman Empire, and during the Armenian Genocide.

Dreams of a "Man in white": Christian missionaries in the Islamic world, particularly in the Middle East, are hearing more and more reports are coming of Jesus is personally leading thousands if not millions of Muslims into the Christian fold.

appearing in their dreams and visions as the "Man in white."

Even when Muslims are observing their holy fasting month of Ramadan - a time when they are supposed to get them closer to Allah - many are getting closer to Jesus instead.

A recent study showing how Muslims are turning to Jesus in great numbers, with some of them saying Jesus Christ Himself made them to turn their backs on Islam.

From 1960 to 2010, the number of Muslims that have converted to faith in Jesus Christ has grown from fewer than 200,000 to some 10 million people. It seems that many Muslims have become disillusioned by the seemingly unending conflict and bloodshed in the Middle East.

In the last 10-15 years, many Muslims are deeply uncomfortable with the idea that ISIS, or Iran's leadership, or Assad are the type of people that represent Islam.

Despite the Muslim public's disillusionment, Christian missionaries are still finding it difficult to reach out to them because of the danger involved and the many restrictions imposed by Islamic rulers.

But now Christian missionaries and evangelists have found a most potent ally in spreading the faith—Jesus Christ Himself! Encounters with him include:

- Jesus showing Himself to Muslim families in refugee camps;
- Muslim refugees aboard a boat seeing Jesus among them while crossing a stormy Aegean Sea;
- Jesus appearing before an Islamic fighter and stopping him from killing a Christian pastor;
- Jesus showing Himself to a bedridden Muslim mother;
- A fiercely anti-Christian imam who turned to Jesus after seeing Him in his dream.

Seats in Church: The practice of Pew Letting has, mercifully, disappeared from all but one Parish Church in the Church of England. My predecessor, I am given to understand, made it very clear, that was not something that he would countenance, and nor do I.

I was therefore, somewhat horrified to be told before Easter that someone had asked a person to move as "that seat is mine." That attitude is one sure way to discourage people from joining us for worship, and as I made very clear recently, I am not running a social club and especially not running a private members club.

All the seats in the nave and the gallery are available to anyone to sit in. While some may prefer to sit in a particular seat—I wish to make it very clear that no one is to be asked to move. If you arrive and someone is sitting in a seat you may usually sit in then there are plenty of other seats available.

Chalice Etiquette: I must remind everyone once more that the Chalice Assistants have been trained to administer the Precious Blood, and that no one should attempt to take the Chalice out of their hands, nor attempt to grab hold of it, as this could lead to the Precious Blood being spilt.

Similarly, the Chalice assistants have been trained to wipe the exterior and the top edge of the rim of the Chalice. They do not wipe the interior for two reasons: firstly because this can lead to the purificator (the small, folded linen cloth used to wipe the Chalice) becoming soaked in the Precious Blood, and secondly, because it is not necessary as when alcohol and silver meet germs cannot survive.

I also ask that everyone refrains from making requests of Chalice Assistants at the Altar Rails, as this disturbs the moment of Communion for the Communicants either side of you.

The Martyrs of Armenia: Armenia is located at the east end of modern Turkey, with some of its traditional territory now in Turkey and some across the border in the former Soviet Union. The Armenians were converted to Christianity around 280 or 290, and are accounted as the first country to become predominantly Christian. Their country is located at a spot where empires have clashed for centuries, and they have often been caught in the middle. For centuries they have been dominated by their Islamic neighbours, most recently the Turks of the Ottoman Empire.

The Turks were concerned about the possibility of an Armenian revolt. In 1895 and 1896 the Turkish Army killed about 100.000 Armenian civilians. Then in 1915, early in World War I, with Turkey fighting on the side of Germany and Austria-Hungary, and Russia fighting in alliance with the British and French on the other side, the Turkish government accused the Armenians of plotting with the Russians to assist a Russian invasion of Turkey. That spring, around 600,000 Armenians were killed by the Turkish Army, in an attempt to exterminate the Armenians completely. Much of the slaughter took place on 24 April 1915.

There are photos recently published on the internet of crucifixions of Christians in Armenia by the Turkish Army, that were in the custody of the secret archives of the Vatican. They did unspeakable things to the pregnant women and their infants. More than a million and a half Armenian Christians
