REFLECTION - THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

"The fundamental dogma, on which everything in Christianity is based "

The dogma of faith which forms the object of the feast is this: There is one God and in this one God there are three Divine Persons; the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. Yet there are not three Gods, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is not more God than the Son, neither is the Son more God than the Holy Spirit. The Father is the first Divine Person; the Son is the second Divine Person, begotten from the nature of the Father from eternity; the Holy Spirit is the third Divine Person, proceeding from the Father and the Son. No mortal can fully fathom this sub-lime truth. But I submit humbly and say: *Lord, I believe, help my weak faith.*

Why is this feast celebrated at this particular time? It may be interpreted as a finale to all the preceding feasts. All three Persons contributed to and shared in the work of redemption. The Father sent His Son to earth, for "God so loved the world as to give His only-begotten Son." The Father called us to the faith. The Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, became man and died for us. He redeemed us and made us children of God. He ever remains the liturgist *par excellence* to whom we are united in all sacred functions. After Christ's ascension the Holy Spirit, however, became our Teacher, our Leader, our Guide, our Consoler. On solemn occasions a thanksgiving *Te Deum* rises spontaneously from Christian hearts.

The feast of the Most Holy Trinity may well be regarded as the Church's *Te Deum* of gratitude over all the blessings of the Christmas and Easter seasons; for this mystery is a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost. This feast, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost, should make us mindful that actually every Sunday is devoted to the honour of the Most Holy Trinity, that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall in a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Blessed Trinity is bestowing upon us. The Father created and predestined us; on the first day of the week He began the work of creation. The Son redeemed us; Sunday is the "Day of the Lord," the day of His resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us His temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, therefore, is *the* day of the Most Holy Trinity.

F) SHIPWRECK: Seafaring remains one of the world's most dangerous occupations. The United Nations view it as the world's second most dangerous occupation, after coal-mining. Many fatal accidents at sea are caused by dangerous weather conditions such as storms, hurricanes and typhoos, which come on guickly and can be deadly. Other fatal accidents are caused by human error. such as with collisions and groundings.

Shipwreck and sinking vessels are becoming increasingly rare as modern navigation and satellite communications continue to improve. However, 2015 was regarded as one of the most deadly on record, with the Costa Concordia, the Bulk Jupiter, the Cemfjord and El Faro disasters claiming over 100 lives. The Mission to Seafarers is very aware that shipwreck continues to threaten and take lives at sea and we strive to ensure that in the event of disaster at sea, we are on hand to provide comfort and care to the families left behind.

Our Mission to Seafarers' families' project in Manila the Philippines works to help those affected by shipwreck. Seafarers that survive shipwreck and other maritime accidents also reguire protection, care and support in the aftermath of serious incidents. They may need couselling, post-traumatic stress care and assistance with contacting home. We will always strive to promote safe working conditions for seafarers and support them and their families in times of need.

It is important for ship owners to understand that access to personal emails, Skype, Facebook and Whatsapp services is vital to ensuring that seafarers maintain healthy and lasting relationships at home. Access to broadband is essential for every seafarer's wellbeing and tackles chronic isolation, depression and work place stress.

The Mission to Seafarers is very aware that connections home are of vital important to good mental health and happiness on board. That is why we supply SIM mobile top up cards, Wi-Fi services in port and help with access to the internet for seafarers as soon as they come ashore. Many of the Mission's 120 Flying Angel Seafarers' Centres have laptops and broadband access, as well as computers and landlines.

We are working with communications suppliers, such at iVitta and other mobile providers, as well as global satellite companies, to improve communications for seafarers in the workplace. The Mission has also set up a new joint partnership with the North American Maritime Ministry Assocation (NAMMA) to deliver a Digital Centre for Seafarers' Ministry - called the MARE project.

C) FATIGUE: working at sea is a 24/7/365 occupation. The ship never sleeps and seafarers work in shifts to make sure that the ship is safe and on course to deliver to a tight port schedule. Working long hours is part of life at sea, but the Mission is very clear that seafarers must be allowed proper rest periods according to the regulations laid down in the Maritime Labour Convention (2006).

D) MENTAL HEALTH problems on board ships is a key area of concern for The Mission to Seafarers and for seafarers and their families. There are a range of mental health conditions that Mission port chaplains are professionally trained to deal with including depression, despair, loneliness, workplace stress and post-traumatic stress syndrome. Many mental health conditions are treatable if tackled quickly and effectively by health care professionals. Unfortunately mental health problems are still a taboo subject in many cultures and difficult to diagnose at sea, when other factors may be involved, such as alcohol or drug problems.

Mission chaplains offer friendship and support to all seafarers when they come into port. Ship-visiting services are particularly important to safeguarding mental health, as are our Mission Flying Angel Seafarers' Centres. Good mental health depends upon having proper rest and relaxation in the workplace.

The Mission to Seafarers' port chaplains have been professionally trained in advanced mental health care and post-traumatic stress counselling by expert psychological trauma consultant Dr Marion Gibson of the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation USA.

E) PIRACY: The Mission to Seafarers has campaigned tirelessly for more public attention to be focused on the issue of pirate attack and maritime violence. Whilst the incidents of piracy worldwide has thankfully continued to fall year on year, the rise of hijacking at sea, kidnap and violence has risen in new places, such as Nigeria and Equatorial Guinea in Africa; and in Malaysia and Indonesia.

The Maritime Piracy Human Response Programme (MPHRP) was set up to track incidents of piracy and help seafarers and their families to recover from incidents of pirate attack worldwide. The Mission to Seafarers supports the MPHRP and port chaplains are trained in post-trauma stress care to help support those affected.

Currently in 2016, piracy warnings have been issued for the following locations: Bangladesh, China, India, Indonesia, Malacca Straits, Malaysia, Singapore Straits, South China Sea, Vietnam, Benin, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Nigeria, The You are blest in the firmament of heaven. $\ensuremath{\mathbb{R}}$

Of course. even aids like this can lead to further questions and even a thirst for greater knowledge. Therefore, to encourage us all in our reading of Holy Scripture I am preparing to launch an excellent DVD based Course on the Scriptures as soon as possible. The 8 Week Course is called 'Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible' and I have posted a trailer for the Course on the Parish Facebook page. Sea Sunday: On Sunday 9th July the entire Church is committed to praying and promoting the work of its mission amongst sailors.

Most denominations support some form of mission amongst sailors or a particular charity. In the Church of England our Charity is the 'Missions to Seafarers', while the Roman Catholic Church's Mission is called 'The Apostleship of the Sea.' What matters is that we care about those who lead an often very hard working life, away from home and loved ones; not forgetting the many seafarers that, when they return to their home port, have no loved ones to share their lives with.

Some of the issues that the Mission to Seafarers are called upon to be involved are:

A) ABANDONMENT of ships and of the crews on board has been highlighted by

The Mission to Seafarers as one of the most important issues affecting seafarers. Ships are abandoned by unscrupulous ship owners when they have financial problems or become embroiled in legal disputes. Ships are left in port or at anchorage, as the money has dried up to pay for port costs, unloading fees and wages. Abandonment has a technical definition which is laid out in the Maritime Labour Convention (2006). A ship is technically abandoned once the ship owner has ceased to communicate with a ship for more than 8 weeks. However, during those 8 weeks, when seafarers are stranded, they will also need care and support.

The Mission provides emergency assistance for abandoned seafarers, including financial assistance for food, water and fuel. We work with port authorities, shipping companies, flag states and the International Transport Workers' Federation to mediate between parties to settle disputes.

Many seafarers have to remain on board abandoned vessels, to ensure that they are paid wages owing to them. Wages that are vital to feeding, clothing and educating their families at home.

B) COMMUNICATION: Access to email and the internet at sea is severely restricted for ordinary seafarers. Satelitte communications are used as essential aids to navigation and ship to shore email for logistics. However, seafarers do not have access to often limited and expensive broadband services at sea. It is estimated that only 28% of seafarers have access to the internet when they are in deep sea locations. The situation continues to improve, and many reputable ship owners are making internet and broadband communications available to their crews, but much more needs to be done.
