REFLECTION - PENTECOST

"When the day of Pentecost had come..."

Today at Mass, particularly at as we receive Holy Communion, the power of the Holy Spirit will come down upon us; fiery tongues will not be seen, but invisible tongues of fire will not be absent. There was still another external manifestation of the Holy Spirit; the apostles and disciples were enabled to speak various languages.

After the roar of the wind many of Jerusalem's pilgrims hurried to the Cenacle. Pentecost was one of the three festivals which obliged all Jews to be present in Jerusalem. Jews from distant lands, and Jewish converts from paganism too, attended these feasts. As a result, a colourful crowd speaking a variety of languages surrounded the house. Now the apostles, who so shortly before had hid in fear behind locked doors, came forth and courageously walked among the multitude speaking to each in his native tongue. It was indeed amazing! Galileans, and multilingual? But the malicious too were present; they had the answer. Nothing marvellous at all!

Those Galileans were simply drunk, and their drunken babble sounded like a foreign language! Peter showed no hesitation in answering the charge. None of their number, he said, were intoxicated; it was but nine o'clock in the morning, and at that hour men usually are sober. What the multitude saw was, in fact, the fulfilment of Joel's prophecy: In those days (of the Messiah), God will pour forth His Spirit upon men and they will prophesy. Then the apostle pointed his words more directly against the accusers: they had killed Jesus, had nailed Him to the Cross; but God had awakened Him and after His departure to heaven, He sent the Holy Spirit. The pilgrims who had heard Peter give this first Pentecostal sermon "were pierced to the heart and said: Brethren, what shall we do? But Peter said to them: Repent and be baptized; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Three thousand responded.

One final question: why the miracle of tongues? In answer, recall the story regarding the tower of Babel. Puffed up by pride, men attempted to build a tower that would touch the heavens. To punish their sin, God confused their speech. Sin causes confusion and division. Now Christ came to gather all men into His Church and thereby to unite them to Himself. This should result in creating but one family of nations again. To this blessed state the miracle of tongues points.

Yes, even we as individuals have a gift of tongues which all men can understand. It is the gift of love infused into us by the Holy Spirit. Love unites, love is a common language, by means of love we can speak to all nations.

him with a bag, CBC news agency reported.

"Courageous martyrs" - at the Vatican on Sunday, after praying the Regina Caeli with faithful and pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis himself described the Coptic Christians who were massacred on Friday as "courageous martyrs."

"The victims, who included children, were faithful who were traveling to a shrine to pray, and they were killed after they refused to deny their Christian faith. May the Lord receive into His peace these courageous witnesses, these martyrs, and convert the hearts of the terrorists." the Pope said.

In a poignant coincidence, President Al-Sissi of Egypt had a church built in the city of Minya to pay tribute to the 20 Egyptian Coptic Christians slain by Daesh on a Libyan beach on February 15. 2015. The victims, who were originally from the region, are also thought to have died as martyrs. Many of them pronounced the Name of Jesus before their throats were slit. They are now included in the catalog of the Coptic Saints and are remembered on February 15.

"Their only words were: 'Jesus, help me!'," Pope Francis said on Februarv 16, 2015, one day after their death. "They were killed simply for the fact that they were Christians.... The blood of our Christian brothers and sisters is a testimony which cries out to be heard.... Their blood confesses Christ."

From the Rector: The Coptic Church has suffered virtually continuous persecution since it was founded by St Mark, the Evangelist in the First Century AD. If you want to know more about this Church and what its members have endured for centuries, then I recommend the book: "Motherland Lost: The Egyptian and Coptic Quest for Modernity" by Samuel Tadros (Hoover Institution Press) It is available in Hardback, and also, much more cheaply, in a Kindle Edition.

The Coptic martyrs of Minya - poignant accounts of their final moments:

While celebrating the liturgical feast of the Lord's Ascension into heaven, as they made their way to the monastery of St. Samuel, 200 kilometres south of Cairo, dozens of Coptic pilgrims were murdered in a bloody ambush carried out by the Islamic State.

At least 29 persons were killed, and 25 wounded, as the terrorists opened fire on the pilgrims. It was the fourth attack against Christians in Egypt since December to be claimed by the ISIS, and comes in the wake of the suicide bombing on two churches in Cairo, in early April, that killed

According to several witnesses,

in the case of the Minya attack everything seems to indicate that the Egyptian Copts who were killed on Friday — many of them children — died as objective martyrs of the Faith. After robbing the pilgrims of their money, their jewels and other precious effects, witnesses say the terrorists told them to apostatise and pronounce the Islamic profession of faith: the shahada. The captives, kneeling, categorically refused. According to reports, they were immediately shot in the neck, head, throat or chest.

The French daily, the *Libération*, on Monday published the poignant account of its special envoy in the village of Nazlet, a town that is mourning seven victims:

"A dozen masked and armed men cut us off and asked us to renounce God. They were told no; there is no question about it, so the massacre began," one woman said.

Fr. Pernaba Fawzi Hanine, who serves parish priest in Nazlet, used the term "martyr" without any hesitation:

"We must be proud of our beloved dead. None of them denied God. They died as believers. They are our martyrs."

A correspondent for the French news agency, *France Presse*, reported similar testimonies in an article published last Sunday: "They drove the men off the bus, took their ID cards and the gold they had on them, including their wedding rings." Then "they asked them to pronounce the Muslim profession of faith," says Maher Tawfik, a man who came from Cairo to Bani Mazar in Minya Province to support his bereaved parish.

Fr. Rashed, like his brother priest in Nazlet, also emphasized the heroism and faithfulness of the victims:

"They asked them to deny their Christian faith, one by one, but they all refused," the priest said.

One survivor, a small boy who seemed to be about six, said his mother pushed him under her seat and covered


Future Fundraising Events for All Saints: Jill Barby would be delighted to hear from all those who are willing to help with future fundraising

Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible: For many of us the Scriptures can seem a mystery, and the 'Cover to Cover' edition of the Scriptures can help us make more sense of its historical timeline. Of course, even aids like this can lead to further questions and even a thirst for greater knowledge. Therefore, to encourage us all in our reading of Holy Scripture I am preparing to launch an excellent DVD based Course on the Scriptures as soon

as possible. The 8 Week Course is called 'Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible' and I have posted a trailer for the Course on the Parish Facebook page. If you are a Facebook member then simply send a request to join our group: 'Parish of Stony Stratford with Calverton.'

This Autumn will see the launch of this Course. Unfortunately, current diary commitments do not allow for a sensible running of the Course without having to stop and start. As well as an evening Course, there will also be a day-time Course as well; as I am aware that not everyone is able to attend evening sessions. Each participant will have a high quality booklet, Bible Timeline and bookmark to aid us as we go through the Course.



One session of the Course will be held at 7:00pm on Tuesday evenings and another at 2:00pm on Thursday afternoons - both at the Rectory. The Course will be begin in the week beginning 17th September with the meetings in that and subsequent weeks being at 7:00pm on Tuesday 19th September and at 2:00pm on Thursday 21st September. The Course is eight sessions long and there will be a break of two weeks after the first four sessions. The Course will be repeated twice next year, hopefully on

different days, so as to allow as many of us as possible to participate.

Please pray for the success of this course. A 'overview of the Course will be held in the Parish Hall before the Summer Holidays - as with the actual course on an evening and a daytime.

Ember Days: The Church of England's Liturgical Calendar sets aside the Wednesday Friday and Saturday of this week as 'Ember Days.'

Ember days (a corruption from Latin Quatuor Tempora, four times) are the days at the beginning of the seasons ordered by the Church as days of fast and abstinence. They were defini-

tively arranged and prescribed for the entire Church by Pope Gregory VII (1073-1085) for the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after 13 December (S. Lucia), after Ash Wednesday, after Whitsunday, and after 14 September (Exaltation of the Cross).

The purpose of their introduction, besides the general one intended by all prayer and fasting, was to thank God for the gifts of nature, to teach men to make use of them in moderation, and to assist the needy.

This was to counter the practice of the of the heathens of Rome, who, given to agriculture, worshipped 'gods' belonging to the same class. At the beginning of the time for seeding and harvesting religious ceremonies were performed to implore the help of their deities: in June for a bountiful harvest, in September for a rich vintage, and in December for the seeding.

The Church, when converting heathen nations, has always tried to sanctify any practices which could be utilized for a good purpose.

Αt first the Church in Rome had fasts in June, September, and December; the exact days were not fixed but were announced by the priests. The "Liber Pontificalis" ascribes to Pope Callistus (217-222) a law ordering the fast, but probably it is older. Leo the considers Great (440-461) an Apostolic institution. When the fourth season was added cannot be ascertained, but Gelasius (492-496) speaks of all four. This pope also permitted the conferring of priesthood and deaconship on the Saturdays of ember week-these were formerly given only at Easter.

Before Gelasius the Ember Days were known only in Rome, but after his time their observance spread. They were brought into England by St. Augustine.
