

THE TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

11th October AD 2020



Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

How foolish the Pharisees were in not listening to our Lord's warnings. He gave them every opportunity to turn away from the false path which their pride had chosen for them. His divine heart was ever ready to embrace them if only they would say "mea culpa." "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets, and stone them that are sent to you, how often would I have gathered together your children, as the hen does her chickens under her wings, and you would not" (Mt. 23:37)? "God created us without our cooperation," says St. Augustine. "but he cannot save us unless we cooperate."

We can also make the same mistake as the Pharisees. We are invited to the wedding feast; in fact, we are already in the banquet hall, since our baptism; but are we wearing the wedding garment of virtue and grace? If not, we are no better off than those who rejected the invitation. The king may come in at any moment and cast out those who are not properly dressed. Being a member of the Church on earth is a wonderful privilege, and a sure guarantee that we will reach heaven, if we do what is expected of us. But the same obstacles which prevented the Pharisees from entering the kingdom - love of this world, its wealth and its pleasures - can impede us too, unless we are on our guard. The world with its allurements is very close to us; heaven seems very far away. Thus we must be prepared to do away with our base inclinations, to go against them whenever and wherever "the things that are Caesar's" tend to blot out or make us forget "the things that are God's."

This implies a daily carrying of the cross, a daily struggle against our evil inclinations, a daily endeavour to acquire true love of God and neighbour. This may sound beyond our capabilities, but Christ did not ask anyone to do the impossible, and we are promised that he is with us on our journey and that the Holy Spirit will guide us. Our Lord Jesus Christ led the way, and millions have followed him to eternal glory. He also calls us to follow him and has placed within our reach in his Church all the grace we need through his Word and Sacraments. If we neglect to avail ourselves of these divine helps, if we are found without the wedding garment, then the parable this morning shows us the consequences of our neglect. In our modern age it is common to embrace a culture of blame when things go wrong for ourselves, sometimes yes we are let down, but very often we fail because we do no accept responsibility for our thoughts, words and deeds. However, the call remains, it is addressed to each of us today and every day. We have been called with the many. We can be among the 'chosen.' Are we prepared to accept the call to take up our cross and follow Christ?

INFORMATION

Safeguarding: Our Parish Churches have adopted and follow the Diocese of Oxford's recommended policies for the safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults. Details of these policies and of our Safeguarding Officers are available on the noticeboards inside each Parish Church. Should you have any safeguarding concerns then please see one of them.

Restrictions During the Current Pandemic:

Unfortunately, there are certain restrictions that we are required to observe for some time. I am sure that you will understand that whilst these are requirements placed upon us, they have been done so for good reason.

- Face-coverings: MUST BE WORN by all attending worship as required by Law, apart from the Priest and any Lay Ministers assisting him. The ONLY exceptions to this Law are where a worshipper has a Respiratory Illness that would be aggravated by wearing a mask, or where a worshipper has a physical or mental condition that would make the putting on of a mask impossible. Those not wearing masks inside our churches during worship when they should be are putting others at risk of infection, and are politely asked to ensure that from now on they wear masks or if not a face shield. If you have a written exemption from your GP (N.B. Lanyards are not proof) please show this to the Rector, so that he can reassure others if he is asked.
- ♦ Sidesmen: It would be very helpful, especially at St Mary & St Giles to have one of the team scheduled to be on duty each Sunday to guide people up to the altar rail row by row during the distribution of Holy Communion.
- Only 3 or 4 Church Bells are permitted to be rung, because ringing chambers are not large enough for distancing requirements when a full team is present. The Tower Captain and Assistant must keep a record of who is present to ring on what dates and ensure that distancing is maintained on the staircase. Bell ringing practice is not permitted.
- Entry and exit to our Parish Churches must be via separate doors

 entry via the West (Tower) Door and exit via the Parish Hall at St
 Mary & St Giles entry via the South Porch and exit via the West
 (Tower) Door at All Saints
- There cannot be an social gathering in either of our Parish Churches before or after Mass - social intercourse may take place in the churchyards before or after Mass. Please allow the priest time to take off his vestments and move to the churchyard before leaving either of our churches yourselves.
- There will be no 'shared' Mass cards. Instead each week new Orders of Mass will be printed with the full text of the Mass printed upon them. Please do not take a copy for someone else either retain it for your devotions at home, or place it in the bin provided at the exit points in both churches.
- Until further notice all communal singing, singing rehearsals and concerts are prohibited in all places of worship. It is now possible to have a single person as Cantor and Organ Music played.
- ◆ Collections: Cash donations and envelopes must be placed either in the large plinth donations box at St Mary & St Giles, or in the bowl by the south porch door at All Saints. We are not allowed to pass a collection plate/bag to one another.
- 'The Peace' may not be shared physically. We may however join our hands and bow to each other at The Peace.
- When going forward to receive Holy Communion at St Mary & St Giles please approach centre of the altar rail in single file via the main aisle, observing a two metre distance, and return to your place via the side aisle. At All Saints: again single file two metres apart but keeping to the south porch side of the main aisle on approaching the altar rail and returning to your place on the vestry side. N.B. in both churches Holy Communion must be received whilst standing and please extend your arms as far as you are able. Textile kneelers and cushions have had to be removed.
- "Receiving Holy Communion" is in one kind, i.e. The Host. This
 must be received in the palms of our hands and not on the
 tonque.
- Please maintain a two metre distance from each other on approaching the altar rails and on leaving our churches after Mass.
- Lavatory Facilities. Strict hand-hygiene must be observed and hand-dryers only used. In the lavatory at each church there will be a spray sanitiser and single use sanitising wipes for each user to wipe the seat, flush-handle, water taps, sink and door handle. Used wipes should be placed in the waste baskets provided.

All of these restrictions, whilst not what we would wish for, do not detract from the fact that we are able to receive the Lord in his Blessed Sacrament
