The Project at All Saints is nearing completion, but with the flooring having been restored concerns have been raised about the need for ongoing protection of the flooring from dirt and grit. These matters are being looked into.

The Treasurer reported on the current state of the Parish's finances and although income has not increased as might have been hoped we are on course to at least equal, if not pay a little more, of the Parish Share this year. The Treasurer would like us to get to the point of being able to pay at least £43,000 annually towards the Parish Share - it being a figure at which he believes we would be covering the actual cost of the ministry. After that we can aim towards the extra costs that the Diocese ask of us. Progress towards placing a cashless donation card reading machine in St Mary & St Giles is being made, and the donate button on the Parish Website is now working. Those who online can now buv goods sign up 'easyfundraising' which makes a small donation to St Mary & St Giles every time you make a purchase from participating companies.

Mr Mullins gave a report of progress at St Mary & St Giles school, which has been considerable. Mrs Wiseman, Mr Ellens and Fr Victor Bullock had been appointed as Governors to the School for the period up to Academisation.

Mrs Wiseman had submitted a Safeguarding Report which outlined concerns following the IICSA reports. The Rector and she share the view of a growing number of people that Safeguarding Procedures should be removed from the control of all organisations, including churches, and placed with an entirely independent body as to as to be fully transparent to victims and the accused. Mrs Wiseman also raised the matter of the care of vulnerable people at this time of shielding and self-isolating, and asks that our Safeguarding Officers be contacted by anyone with any concerns.


The Rector is still awaiting news from Ormbys of Scarisbrick who are designing new Sanctuary Seating at St Mary in St Giles in memory of the late Larry Francis and his mother. The lockdown has, of course, disrupted this company's ability to work.

Dates for the meetings of the Parochial Church Council as well as Annual Meetings were agreed for 2021.

The Rector reported on the reopening of our churches for public worship, with the proviso that there were unknown factors with regard to the new Tier System and as to whether congregational singing would be permitted or not.







As Blessed John Henry Newman reminded us in a homily for the Advent Season: "Advent is a time of waiting, it is a time of joy because the coming of Christ is not only a gift of grace and salvation but it is also a time of commitment because it motivates us to live the present as a time of responsibility and vigilance. This 'vigilance' means the necessity, the urgency of an industrious, living 'wait'. To make all this happen, then we need to wake up, as we are warned by the apostle to the Gentiles, in his letter to the Romans: 'Besides this you know what hour it is, how it is full time now for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed!" (Rm 13:11).

We are called to start our journey to ascend to the mountain of the Lord, to be illuminated by His Words of peace and to allow Him to indicate the path to tread (cf. Is 2:1-5). Moreover, we are called to change our conduct, abandoning the works of darkness and to put on the 'armour of light,' and so seek only to do God's work and to abandon the deeds of the flesh (cf. Rm 13:12-14). Jesus, through the Gospel this morning, outlines the Christian duty to watch, that we ought not to be distracted or indifferent, but must be vigilant and recognise even the smallest sign of the Lord's coming because we don't know the hour in which He will arrive (cf. Mark 13: 33-37).

Prayer Thought before Mass

The word 'Advent' means arrival or coming: the arrival or coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. The risen Lord of the universe has already arrived. All through the past year he has been nearer to us than we are to ourselves. Each year, in Advent, we long for him to come to us with even greater power. We long for him to open our minds and hearts wider so that he can give us more of his riches. We long too for hope in his

final coming in glory when he will be seen as Lord giving us to the Father. Come, Lord Jesus'.

PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parochial Church Council met on the evening of Tuesday 24th November via ZOOM - but not without some significant teething problems with access! However, eventually all but one member was able to join in. If we have to meet 'virtually' again, then we are seriously considering using Microsoft Teams as it is more secure, and isn't time limited (for more than 40 minute meetings on ZOOM, payment is required).

The Rector reported that the Terrier and Inventories (Property Registers) were now complete for both churches in the new format. These had been major documents to revise and bring up to date, and he is grateful to all those who supplied information.

The Log Books, which record repairs, regular maintenance and works authorised by faculty, for both churches have now to be updated and put into a new format. Unfortunately, the Log Book for All Saints will not be complete as the previous edition was inadvertently disposed of with a change of Churchwarden some years ago. However, that for St Mary & St Giles simply needs bringing up to date, albeit that the 'cutting and pasting' into the new format will take time. From this point on all four documents will be held in double form in hard copy and also held digitally on the Parish 'Drop Box' account, as well as on the Rector's computer. This will also aid updating digitally, with updated hard copies only being required annually for the Archdeacon's Visitation.

The PCC has now reviewed all of its policies and has agreed necessary changes to Safeguarding, Fire Risk, Risk Assessment and Health & Safety Polic-

The Rector reported on the ongoing situation with regard to the important need for repairs to the Sacristy and Vestry Roofs at St Mary & St Giles. 'Historic England' (HE) had not sent the grant application as they had promised, and then suddenly sent it with only seven days before submission was due. The Architect and he had discussed this with HE, and it had given the Rector a further seven days in which to get an application for a grant in. It is still doubtful as to whether this will be possible to achieve as at least three quotations for the work are required. We are hoping that if we do not make this application date, then another round of applications may be made early next year. The PCC agreed to explore other avenues of funding as the longer these important works are left incomplete there is a greater likelihood of damage from water ingress to the fabric of the building and with that eventuality a greater cost.

The PCC received a report of recent repairs to the heating system at St Mary & St Giles. The engineer had reported that the System has two pumps and that it always runs on Pump No1. the second pump has seized up, but he wasn't worried about that as it is only a back-up for when No1 pump fails. The PCC could not understand why a second pump had been installed in the first place given that the system is not that for a large commercial or industrial complex nor indeed for a block of residential dwellings. It was agreed that the heating engineer be asked for further clarification.

PASTORAL LETTER

from Bishop Jonathan Goodall to the parishes and clergy of the See of Ebbsfleet

Daily Prayers for the weeks of Advent

Dear friends, dear brothers and sisters:

Each month now I have sent a letter to you to help encourage you and assure you of my prayers for you in our unprecedented situation. This month, the month of Advent, I want to invite you to do something different. I want to invite you, clergy and people of the parishes in the see of Ebbsfleet, to join in prayer with me as your bishop, prayer that is both personal and shared, so that we can be more united in heart and mind during the remaining weeks before Christmas. Each day—whatever the news, whatever is happening in daily life—please make space, either as part of your present prayer, or at another time, to read the daily Scripture verse from your Bible, and say the prayer ... slowly. (I've added in brackets the daily Gospel passage for those who prefer that). I shall say it each day at 12.00, perhaps after the Angelus, and I hope you will join me. May the Lord help us, despite all the fuss of our pre-Christmas lives, and the worries and bruises of the pandemic, to focus our eyes on what is truly essential. And I hope that this opening meditation will remain with you throughout.

Meditation

Every parent—especially every mother—yearns to see the face of any child that is being carried in the womb. It is a long process of expectation and waiting; it involves a longing and a desire that can no more be stifled than it can be stopped. Mary and Joseph and their small family circle must have longed and desired to see the face of Jesus in just this way — perhaps even more so given what had been prophesied about him. Mary was, we sing in one Christmas hymn, "Most blest to bring to human birth / the Long-Desired of all the earth'. During Advent, in some of our most loved hymns, the Church too remembers and sings about her longing and desire to see the Lord's face when he comes again, and in our Christmas festivities we celebrate that we will not be disappointed: we will come to the goal of all human life — that is, to see God and be united with him for ever.

But for now it is like we are blind, like the 'two blind men sitting by the roadside' (in *Matthew* 20.30-34) who, 'when they heard that Jesus was passing by, they cried out, "Lord, have mercy on us, Son of David!" Commenting on this passage in a sermon St Augustine says, the goal of 'all of our work in this life'—all our Christian discipleship—'is to restore to health the eye of the heart so that God may be seen". Restoring to health the eye of our hearts. This is the purpose, he says, of the Sacraments, the preaching of the word, all our training and effort to live a good moral life, and all the changes that have to happen in our lives so that we may be rid of whatever prevents us from seeing God. That is also the purpose of these prayers.
