Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

At the end of the Gospel reading today, Simeon's prophecy of Mary's sufferings is emphasized. Simeon's words seem like a second Annunciation to Mary, for they tell her of the actual historical situation in which the Son is to accomplish his mission, namely, in misunderstanding and sorrow. The archangel's announcement was a fount of incredible joy because it proclaimed Jesus' messianic royalty and the supernatural character of His virginal conception. The announcement of the elderly Simeon in the temple instead spoke of the Lord's work of redemption that He would complete associating Himself through suffering to His Mother. Therefore, there is a strong Marian dimension to this feast and so in the Liturjcal Calendar of the Book of Common Prayer it is called the 'Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary.' This refers to the other aspect of the presentation that consists of the ritual purification of Jewish women after they had given birth. In Mary's case this purification was not necessary, but it indicates the renewal of her total offering of herself to God for the accomplishment of His Divine Plan.

Simeon's prophecy also announces that Christ will be 'a sign of contradiction'. St Cyril of Alexandria, in one of his homilies, interpreted the words 'sign of contradiction' like a noble cross, as St Paul wrote to the Corinthians 'a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles' (1 Corinthians 1:23) It is a sign of contradiction in the sense that those who loose appear as foolish while in those who recognize its power [the cross] reveals salvation and life'

Prayer Thought

Today, we celebrate the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It was his first entry into his Father's house. Mary his mother was purified and Jesus submitted himself to the Jewish Law. In the Temple, Jesus was greeted by Simeon and Anna under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and Simeon blessed God with a canticle, the Nunc Dimittis while prophesying to Mary the suffering that would follow. We too have come to meet our Lord in the house of God and we pray that we will one day greet the Light of Nations in all his glory.

Introduction of the celebration:

Brothers and sisters, forty days have passed since the solemnity of Christmas. Today the Church once again prepares to celebrate the day in which Mary and Joseph presented Jesus in the Temple. With that ceremony our Lord submitted himself to the prescriptions of the old law and came to his people, who waited for him with faith. Guided by the Holy Spirit, the old, holy people Simeon and Anna came to the temple; illumined by the same Spirit, they recognised the Lord and full of joy gave witness to him. We who also are here united by the Holy Spirit go towards an encounter with Christ whom we find and recognise in the breaking of the bread, while we wait for him to come and manifest himself in his glory.

The People raise their candles and Celebrant blesses them:

Let us pray.

O God, fountain and principle of every light, who today revealed to the holy and ancient Simeon the Christ true light of all people, bless ₱ these candles and hear the prayer of your people who come to you with these luminous signs and hymns of praise; guide them along the road of good, until they reach the light without end. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

At the same time this Canticle is said:

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, * according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen * thy salvation,

Which thou hast prepared * before the face of all people; To be a light to lighten the Gentiles, * and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

THE RITE OF BENEDICTION

As the Blessed Sacrament is placed in the Monstrance and exposed to the people - they KNEEL UNTIL THE ANGELUS IS RECITED

The Cantor sings:

O saving Victim, op'ning wide The gate of heav'n to all below! Our foes press on from ev'ry side; Your aid supply, your strength bestow.

All praise and thanks to thee ascend for evermore, blest One in three; O grant us life that shall not end in our true native land with thee.

The Priest leads the People in a **Meditation**, and then the Cantor sings:

Therefore we, before him bending, this great sacrament revere; types and shadows have their ending, for the newer rite is here; faith, our outward sense befriending, makes the inward vision clear.

Glory let us give, and blessing, to the Father and the Son; honour, might and praise addressing, while eternal ages run; ever too his love confessing, who from both, with both is one.

The Priest then stands and says:

Thou gavest them bread from heaven. Containing in itself all sweetness.

The Priest then prays a Collect, after which he kneels to receive the humeral veil on his shoulders. Then he goes up to the Altar, takes the Monstrance into his hands, and turns towards the People. The Priest gives the Benediction, making the sign of the cross over the kneeling congregation as a fanfare is played. Placing the Monstrance back on the Altar the Priest kneels, and giving up the humeral veil, begins:

The Divine Praises

The People repeat each line after the Priest who says

Blessed be God. Blessed be His Holy Name. Blessed be Jesus Christ, true God and true man. Blessed be the name of Jesus. Blessed be His Most Sacred Heart. Blessed be His Most Precious Blood. Blessed be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Altar. Blessed be the Holy Spirit, the paraclete. Blessed be the great Mother of God, Mary most holy. Blessed be her holy and Immaculate Conception. Blessed be her glorious Assumption. Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother. Blessed be Saint Joseph, her most chaste spouse. Blessed be God in His angels and in His Saints.

The Priest removes the Blessed Sacrament from the Monstrance and replaces it in the Tabernacle. The Rite ends with the people reciting THRICE:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The peace of the Lord be with you always.

And also with you.

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

The priest says the Prayer over the Gifts to which all respond: **Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

The priest says a Eucharistic Preface appropriate to the celebration, after which all join in the acclamation: (KNEEL)

A small choir sings the Sanctus & Benedictus:

HOLY, HOLY, HOLY, Lord God of, hosts, Heaven and earth are full of thy glory: Glory be to thee, O Lord Most High. Amen.

Blessed is he that cometh in the name of The Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving, recalling the command of Jesus Christ, 'Do this in memory of me.'

Priest: The mystery of faith:

All: We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

The Eucharistic Prayer continues with the priest interceding for the Church, the world, all those present at this celebration, and the Faithful Departed. At the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer all join in the Great Amen.

Priest:	for ever and ever.
All:	Amen.

THE COMMUNION RITE

The priest introduces the Lord's Prayer: (STAND)
