one) with the details required. A Marriage schedule on an A4 sheet of paper will be issued. At the end of the Marriage Rote this will be signed, and subsequently taken to the Register Office. Approximately three weeks later the newly married couple will receive a computer generated Marriage Certificate.

This means that the 'Signing of the Registers' with attendant photography will no longer take place, and the legal responsibility to act as the Registrar will no longer be undertaken by the clergy. Given that the fees for Marriage are laid down by Parliament because they were based upon the legal duties of the clergy with regard to the Registration of Marriages, I do wonder whether this change will affect the income for Parishes and Dioceses derived from what were 'Statutory Fees.'

On Wednesday of last week I had to 'close' the existing Marriage Registers and return them along with spare Certificates and Quarterly Returns to the Registry in Milton Keynes. The Parish will no longer hold Marriage Registers.

The Church of England has, in place of the Registers, required each Parish Church to have a 'Register of Marriage Services.' However, there is no possibility of the couple to sign this Register - it is simply a Register that records that Marriages have taken place and the names of those so married. New Banns Registers for each Church will be used from this point on too.

For many couples looking forward to their 'wedding' this significant change will come as a huge disappointment. It also changes significantly the whole process of the Registration of Marriage. One change is that the mother's names can also now be included along with the father's, and it is something I think we can all see as positive. However, it is sad that legal records will no longer be associated with the place where the Marriage Rite was contracted; and those wishing to research records will have further bureaucratic processes to go through.

In due course, post the lifting of COVID restrictions, I will give everyone an opportunity to see the replacement 'Register of Marriage Services' and the Marriage Schedule.

Celebrants at Mass: A number of people have asked why I have not been celebrating at All Saints on Sundays in the last few months, although I have been doing so on Tuesdays. It is because that it was made quite clear to me that a priest should not go from one church to another immediately to help prevent any potential cross-infection. Once I have passed the two week point after my second vaccination, I would be able to. However, I now have to quarantine and look after Sister Janet from the 4th June, as she has her second hip replacement surgery. My first Sunday back at All Saints, will therefore be the 20th June.



Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

The dogma of faith which forms the object of the feast is this: There is one God and in this one God there are three Divine Persons; the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. Yet there are not three Gods, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is not more God than the Son, neither is the Son more God than the Holy Spirit. The Father is the first Divine Person; the Son is the second Divine Person, begotten from the nature of the Father from eternity; the Holy Spirit is the third Divine Person, proceeding from the Father and the Son. No mortal can fully fathom this sublime truth. But I submit humbly and say: Lord, I believe, help my weak faith.

INFORMATION



Safeguarding: Our Parish Churches have adopted and follow the Diocese of Oxford's recommended policies for the safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults. Details of these policies and of our Safeguarding Officers are available on the noticeboards inside each Parish Church. Should you have any safeguarding concerns then please see one of them.

Restrictions During the Current Pandemic

Unfortunately, we are required to observe the following restrictions:

- FACE MASKS: MUST BE WORN by all attending worship as required by Law, apart from the Priest and any Lay Ministers assisting him. N.B. IF YOU CANNOT WEAR A MASK FOR MEDICAL REASONS YOU MUST WEAR A FACE SHIELD.
- Only 3 or 4 **Church Bells** are permitted to be rung, because ringing chambers are not large enough for distancing requirements when a full team is present. The Tower Captain and Assistant must keep a record of who is present to ring on what dates and ensure that distancing is maintained on the staircase. Bell ringing practice is not permitted.
- Entry and exit to our Parish Churches entry via the West (Tower) Door and exit via the Parish Hall at St Mary & St Giles - entry via the South Porch and exit via the West (Tower) Door at All Saints
- There cannot be an social gathering in either of our Parish Churches before or after Mass - brief social intercourse may take place in the churchyards before or
- 'Shared' **Mass cards** are not permitted. Please do not take a copy for someone else – either retain it for your devotions at home, or place it in the bin provided at the exit points in both churches.
- Until further notice all **communal singing**, singing rehearsals and concerts are prohibited in all places of worship. It is now possible to have a small choir and Organ Music played - a recessional hymn may be sung within in the churchyard.
- **Collections:** Cash donations and envelopes must be placed either in the large plinth donations box at St Mary & St Giles, or in the bowl by the south porch door at All Saints. We are not allowed to pass a collection plate/bag to one another
- 'The Peace' may not be shared physically. We may however join our own hands and bow to each other at The Peace, whilst saying the customary greeting.
- When going forward to receive Holy Communion at St Mary & St Giles please approach centre of the altar rail in single file via the main aisle, observing a two metre distance, and return to your place via the side aisle. At All Saints: again single file two metres apart but keeping to the south porch side of the main aisle on approaching the altar rail and returning to your place on the vestry side. N.B. in both churches Holy Communion must be received whilst standing and please extend your arms as far as you are able. Textile kneelers and cushions have had to be removed.
- 'Receiving Holy Communion' is in one kind, i.e. The Host. This must be received in the palms of our hands - not on the tongue.
- **Please maintain a two metre distance** from each other on approaching the altar rails and on leaving our churches after Mass. **Lavatory Facilities.** Strict hand-hygiene must be observed and hand-dryers only
- used. In the lavatory at each church there is a spray sanitiser and single use sanitising wipes for each user to wipe the seat. flush-handle, water taps, sink and door handle. Used wipes should be placed in the waste baskets provided.

All of these restrictions, whilst not what we would wish for, do not detract from the fact that we are able to receive the Lord in his Blessed Sacrament.

Changes to the Registration of Marriages: as from the 4th May this year the Registration of Marriages is very different to how it has been completed heretofore. Up to the 4th May in the Church of England the Clergy were the Registrars and the 'Marriage Registers' were in their custody, rather than the Parish Churches. The Clergy were, therefore, responsible for all the legal formalities of the Calling of Banns of Holy Matrimony, the completion of the Marriage Registers including ensuring that they were duly signed by the Bride & Groom and two 'of age' witnesses who were UK Citizens, and they issued the Marriage Certificate. Following the Marriage Rite at the end of each quarter year the clergy then sent to the local Register Office a 'Quarterly Return' - a landscape A3 document containing copies of the entries of the Marriages solemnised within the quarter year just ended.

As from the 4th May this year, the clergy will contact the Register Office after Banns have been read, or a Common Licence issued by a Surrogate (of which Fr Ross is The seekers, the pilgrims, the weary are assured of the blessing of God in Christ, and every time Christ comes to men and women it is with the promise of a new life of hope and freedom. 'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shined' (Isaiah 9:2).

Then a very remarkable thing happens. For we find ourselves saying the words of the Divine Praises: 'Blessed be God' Blessed be his holy Name' We came seeking God's blessing, and now we find that we are blessing God! This belongs so naturally to what might be called the spiritual logic of Benediction. A benediction is not something that we can selfishly keep for ourselves. It makes us too want to give a benediction. 'We love, because he first loved us' (1 John 4:19). We begin by coming in our need to God, seeking his blessing. He gives us that blessing, and our response is to bless and adore him. This is indeed the goal of all our worshipping - that we may come to love God better. And we cannot love God without loving our neighbours who are God's children, so that in seeking God's blessing, we are praying that in blessing us he will make us a blessing to others. This is how it has been since the very beginning of the people of God, when the Lord said to Abraham, 'I will bless you, so that you will be a blessing . . .' (Genesis 12:3).

These, then, are some of the meanings contained in the service of Benediction and some of the reasons for prizing it. Let us not miss this time of precious quiet while we wait upon God in humility. Let us not miss the blessing he bestows through the Christ who comes into our midst. For in such acts of devotion we learn to love him better, and he can make us a benediction to all whom we meet."

PARISH NOTICES

Corpus et Sanguis Christi: this Thursday at 09:30 we shall celebrate together Mass for the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. Whilst this will be a said Mass this year, and there will not be a Procession, we shall celebrate Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. I have reproduced below an explanation of Benediction by the late Rev'd Professor John Macquarrie (an Anglican Priest and one-time Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity at the University of Oxford)

"Benediction is a popular service, that is to say, a people's service. The clever and sophisticated do not come much to Benediction, but the simple, the poor, those who acknowledge an emptiness in their lives that only God can fill. Even those who might not come to Holy Communion will sometimes come to Benediction where God reaches out to them though they think they are only on the fringes. I think of some of those with whom I have knelt at Benediction: harassed city-dwellers in New York, working-class people from the back streets of Dublin, soldiers serving in the deserts of North Africa, Indian Christians living as a tiny minority in a great Hindu city . . . They have all had the grace of humility - a quality which, alas, is not greatly encouraged in our new liturgies. But those who seek a blessing come with empty hands. 'How blessed are those who know their need of God' ' (Matthew 5:3 NEB). God cannot give a blessing to the proud, the self-sufficient, the superior, those who secretly despise the simple devotion of their brethren. So we can only come to Benediction waiting and expectant. As we sing the hymns and look upon the Host, we open our hearts to God, knowing that he who sent the blessing of his Son to lighten the darkness of the world still sends through the same Son his blessing to us.

We do not wait on God in vain. Lifting up the Host in a monstrance (sometimes in a ciborium), those quiet opening moments of Benediction are very precious indeed. We take time to compose ourselves, to put ourselves together, as it were. These may be only a few minutes, but they have something of the quality of eternity. We put aside our own busy plans, policies, activities, and remain passive before God so that his voice may be heard and his grace received. This brief time of quiet alone is of inestimable value in that crazy hurried world in which we all have to live nowadays. The officiating priest makes the sign of the cross in blessing over the worshippers. Christ, the Light of the world, shines upon us, and my comparison with the rising sun was appropriate because the monstrance is usually fashioned to resemble the sun's disc, with rays streaming out in all directions. Through Christ, God bestows his blessing upon us and all who are willing to receive

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Recessional: The Organist improvises a recessional voluntary and the congregation IMMEDIATELY leaves the Parish Church to sing the final hymn in the church yard.

However, should the weather be inclement, please remain seated until the Recessional Music has ceased. This is integral to the liturgy of the Organ Mass and therefore applause is not appropriate. Once concluded, leave the Parish Church of St Mary & St Giles via the Parish Hall; and at All Saints via the south door.

Bright the vision that delighted once the sight of Judah's seer; sweet the countless tongues united to entrance the prophet's ear.

Then priest says the Offertory Prayers to which the people respond: **Blessed be God for ever.**

(STAND) Pray brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

The priest says the Prayer over the Offerings:

Sanctify by the invocation of your name, we pray, O Lord our God, this oblation of our service, and by it make of us an eternal offering to you. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you

and also with you.

The priest sings a Eucharistic Preface appropriate to the celebration, after which all join in the acclamation: (KNEEL)

The priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving, recalling the command of Jesus Christ, 'Do this in memory of me.'

Priest: The mystery of faith:

All: We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

The Eucharistic Prayer continues with the priest interceding for the Church, the world, all those present at this celebration, and the Faithful Departed. At the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer all join in the Great Amen.

Priest:for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**
