Of the Reception of Holy Communion:

During the last 16 months it has, sadly, been the case that the Chalice has been withdrawn from the 'Faithful' for reasons of Hygiene by direction of the House of Bishops of the Church of England. This has, understandably, been seen as particular loss by us all. Yet, we have taken great comfort from the ancient teaching of the Church, called the 'Doctrine of Concomitance.'

This doctrine teaches us that it should never be construed, that Communion under the form of bread alone or Communion under the form of wine alone is somehow an incomplete act or that Christ is not fully present to the communicant. The Church's unchanging teaching from the time of the Fathers through the ages - notably in the ecumenical councils of Lateran IV, Constance, Florence, Trent, and Vatican II - has witnessed to a constant unity of faith in the presence of Christ in both elements.

Even in the earliest days of the Church's life, when Communion under both species was the norm, there were always instances when the Eucharist was received under only the form of bread or wine. ... Thus, the Church has always taught the doctrine of concomitance, by which we know that under each species alone, the whole Christ is sacramentally present and we receive all the fruit of Eucharistic grace.

Recently, however, there have been worrying pressures from certain elements who want the Church of England to permit individual 'shot glasses' to be used, as in some non-conformist gatherings. This is totally contrary to the practice of The Church East & West and has no place in the Church that believes itself to be part of the one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church, for the simple reason that Catholic Christians follow the example of the Lord, who used a common cup.

In 1998 the North American Disease Control and Prevention reported that there had never been an outbreak of infection related to the communion cup and that a theoretical risk of transmitting infectious diseases by using a common communion cup exists, but that the risk is so small that it is undetectable.

It is also worth noting that it is the orthodox practice, after the completion of the distribution of Holy Communion, for the priest to consume all of the remaining Precious Blood in the chalice, which carries the microorganisms of all communicants who received Holy Communion This practice also applies when hospitalised patients ask to receive Holy Communion as a last will before dying. As a corollary of this practice, increased morbidity rates for specific infectious diseases, and especially those of the respiratory and gastrointestinal tract, among officiating clergymen might be expected. However, there does not appear to be an obvious increased prevalence of such infections in this occupation.

In summary: the common communion cup may *theoretically* serve as a vehicle of transmitting infection, but the potential risk of transmission is very small. Currently, available data does not provide any support for the suggestion that the practice of sharing a common communion cup can contribute to the spread of COVID-19 because SARS-CoV-2 transmission from a patient with COVID-19 or asymptomatic carrier to other people has not been reported.

Once restrictions are lifted I intend to restore the common cup to those who wish to receive the Precious Blood of Christ.



INFORMATION



Safeguarding: Our Parish Churches have adopted and follow the Diocese of Oxford's recommended policies for the safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults. Details of these policies and of our Safeguarding Officers are available on the noticeboards inside each Parish Church. Should you have any safeguarding concerns then please see one of them.

Restrictions During the Current Pandemic

Unfortunately, we are required to observe the following restrictions:

- ٠ FACE MASKS: MUST BE WORN by all attending worship as required by Law, apart from the Priest and any Lay Ministers assisting him. N.B. IF YOU CANNOT WEAR A MASK FOR MEDICAL REASONS YOU MUST WEAR A FACE SHIELD.
- Only 3 or 4 Church Bells are permitted to be rung, because ringing chambers are not large enough for distancing requirements when a full team is present. The Tower Captain and Assistant must keep a record of who is present to ring on what dates and ensure that distancing is maintained on the staircase. Bell ringing practice is not permitted.
- Entry and exit to our Parish Churches entry via the West (Tower) Door and exit via the Parish Hall at St Mary & St Giles - entry via the South Porch and exit via the West (Tower) Door at All Saints
- There cannot be an social gathering in either of our Parish Churches before or after Mass - brief social intercourse may take place in the churchyards before or after Mass.
- 'Shared' **Mass cards** are not permitted. Please do not take a copy for someone else - either retain it for your devotions at home, or place it in the bin provided at the exit points in both churches.
- Until further notice all communal singing, singing rehearsals and concerts are prohibited in all places of worship. It is now possible to have a small choir and Organ Music played - a recessional hymn may be sung within the churchyard.
- **Collections:** Cash donations and envelopes must be placed either in the large plinth donations box at St Mary & St Giles, or in the bowl by the south porch door at All Saints. We are not allowed to pass a collection plate/bag to one another
- **The Peace'** may not be shared physically. We may however join our own hands and bow to each other at The Peace, whilst saying the customary greeting.
- When going forward to receive Holy Communion at St Mary & St Giles please approach centre of the altar rail in single file via the main aisle, observing a two metre distance, and return to your place via the side aisle. At All Saints: again single file two metres apart but keeping to the south porch side of the main aisle on approaching the altar rail and returning to your place on the vestry side. N.B. in both churches Holy Communion must be received whilst standing and please extend your arms as far as you are able. Textile kneelers and cushions have had to be removed.
- 'Receiving Holy Communion' is in one kind, i.e. The Host. This must be received in the palms of our hands - not on the tongue.
- Please maintain a two metre distance from each other on approaching the altar rails and on leaving our churches after Mass. Lavatory Facilities. Strict hand-hygiene must be observed and hand-dryers only
- used. In the lavatory at each church there is a spray sanitiser and single use sanitising wipes for each user to wipe the seat, flush-handle, water taps, sink and door handle. Used wipes should be placed in the waste baskets provided.

All of these restrictions, whilst not what we would wish for, do not detract from the fact that we are able to receive the Lord in his Blessed Sacrament.

All Saints Open Day & Fete: Following the great success of the 2019 fete, for which we are very grateful to ALL those who volunteered their assistance in any way, this annual event was much missed last year and quite a number of people have expressed the hope to me, as Rector, that it will be able to go ahead this year. To be honest, I would very much like it to go ahead, but it really does depend on having a goodly number of people to make it possible. It will mean people willing to work to prepare before hand, arrange prizes, set up, bake and make, run stalls and refreshments, and help to clear away afterwards. To that end I propose to hold a Planning Meeting in All Saints at 7:00pm on Tuesday 29th June - to which all are invited. At that meeting as well as ascertaining whether it would be possible to hold the fete this year, we would also need to agree a date. It would also be an ideal opportunity for those at All Saints to consider and plan for other fundraising opportunities for the remainder of the year.

As 2021 marks the bi-centenary of the beginning of Rector Perceval's Incumbency and the long association with the Oxford Movement it would be very good if the fete could be one of the significant events of the year. Thank you

1964 caused the tiles to adhere to one another, or, to reduce the cost of replacing the roof tiles after the fire, the tiles were heated so that they adhered to one another. The budget had allowed for up to 60% of the tiles to be replaced, as would normally be expected, but unfortunately none of the present tiles can be used again.

We are attempting to seek additional grants, but that may prove difficult. Therefore, it has been suggested that we seek donations per tile in memory of a loved one. The Rector will produce a list of the names so commemorated suitable to be framed and hung on a wall in the lobby outside the Parish Office for all to see..

Following the launch of this initiative on Sunday 6th June several donations have already been received. It has been suggested that we also open this initiative to a wider group who don't necessarily want to make a donation in memory of a departed loved one, but who would like to make a donation as a Benefactor. In the same way as is intended to commemorate those that tiles have been donated in memory of, it has been suggested that we create a list of Benefactors and also the Grant Making Organisations that have helped us. At the time of producing the Mass Sheet we had already received £505.00 of the £6000.00 extra funding we need to complete the project - Thank you.

There are now two types of forms to donate tiles available in church: the new 'Benefactors' Form and the ones previously issued containing space for the donation of individual tiles in memory of up to ten loved ones and the donation requested for each tile supplied and fitted is £4.99. The completed forms with cash or cheque (payable to 'The PCC of Stony Stratford with Calverton') donations can be handed to either Bob Scarff or Fr Ross. There is also the option of electronic transfer, as the PCC Bank Details are included on the form. You may also know of relations, friends and neighbours who would like to donate tiles in memory of a loved one - so please do take a form for them too. N.B. If you are a taxpayer you can increase the value of your donation by Gift Aiding it - please use the yellow envelopes available in church. Thank you.

Once the exterior works are complete, which is now expected to be by the 25th July, the PCC, when funds permit, wishes to complete the desk work to the east wall of the Parish Office; comprising a taller unit for the parish photocopier - with paper kept above it - space for the filing cabinet along with an extension to the desk. The Parish Office will then gradually become the office from which Parish Administration takes place.

Funeral Arrangements & Making a Bequest in your 'Last Will & Testament: I am convinced that all of you have got a lot of living to do yet ! However, it is not unknown that regular worshippers in parishes are denied the Funeral Service that they would want for themselves, as families or executors do what they would 'like' to happen. All priests can tell you of examples, some quite distressing, where the known funeral wishes of a regular worshipper have been completely ignored. Therefore, it is my strong advice that everyone does two things: firstly, to have your funeral plans added to your 'Last Will and Testament,' and secondly, to let me have a copy of those wishes to keep on file. Fr Cavell kindly left such a file for me, but after 23 plus years it is now quite thin. Recent experiences have led me to draw your attention to this important matter.

Often those making bequest to the Parish Church in their 'Wills' simply leave to the 'Parish Church of' However, that does not guarantee that the bequest will necessarily remain with the Parish Church. It is not unknown for 'officials' in some parts of the Church to look at bequests when parish accounts are sent in annually and where possible appropriate the bequests where the wording is not legally watertight in safeguarding it for a Parish Church. Therefore, when drawing up your 'Last Will and Testament' it is important to use these words for our Parish Churches:

- For St Mary & St Giles: 'I leave the sum of £... (or property address or possessions) to be used at the sole discretion of the Incumbent and Churchwardens for the time being of the Parish Church of St Mary & St Giles, Stony Stratford with Calverton.'
- For All Saints: 'I leave the sum of £... (or property address or possessions) to be used at the sole discretion of the Incumbent and Churchwardens for the time being of the Parish Church of All Saints, Stony Stratford with Calverton.'

The phrase 'for the time being' also ensures that the Incumbent and Churchwardens at the time the bequest is received do not receive it personally, but by virtue of their Office for the benefit of the said Parish Church.

For the souls of the departed we pray for in this Mass, especially...Margaret Barker, Freda Douglas.... and for those whose anniversaries of death occur at this time...27th Eva Griffith, Winifred Lunn; 28th Ella West; Margaret Sharp; 29th Frederick Butler, Joan Whetstone; 30th Tony Holman; 1st July Lily Pell, Roy Newton; 2nd Olive Weir; 3rd Florence Varney... that they may be raised up to eternal joy in heaven...

Rest eternal, grant to them, O Lord. And let light perpetual shine upon them.

Priest: All-powerful God, our lives rest in your hands and our redemption is secure only through Christ your Son. Trusting in your providence we beseech to bring the fulness of redemption to us and all those who long to be saved, through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The Gifts of Bread and Wine are placed upon the altar, as the priest and people say the **Offertory Antiphon** together:

Like as in the burnt offerings of rams and bullocks, and like as in ten thousands of fat lambs, so let this sacrifice of ours be in thy very sight on this day, that it may please thee; because they are not confounded who put their trust in thee, O Lord.

Then priest says the Offertory Prayers to which the people respond: **Blessed be God for ever.**

(STAND) Pray brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father. **May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands** for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

The priest says the Prayer over the Offerings:

O God, who graciously accomplish the effects of your mysteries, grant, we pray, that the deeds by which we serve you may be worthy of these sacred gifts. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

<u>The Eucharistic Prayer</u>

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The priest sings a Eucharistic Preface appropriate to the celebration, after which all join in the acclamation: (KNEEL)

Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving, recalling the command of Jesus Christ, 'Do this in memory of me.'

Priest: The mystery of faith:

All: We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

The Eucharistic Prayer continues with the priest interceding for the Church, the world, all those present at this celebration, and the Faithful Departed. At the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer all join in the Great Amen.

Priest:	for ever and ever.
All:	Amen.

THE COMMUNION RITE

<u>The Lord's Prayer</u>

The priest introduces the Lord's Prayer.

(STAND)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The peace of the Lord be with you always. And also with you.

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

<u>The Agnus Dei</u>

(KNEEL)

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

The priest shows the consecrated Host to the people, saying:

Behold the Lamb of God,

behold him who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called

to the supper of the Lamb.

✤ Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

The priest receives Holy Communion, sanitises his hands and then says the **Communion** Antiphon, after which the people come forward to receive the Blessed Sacrament.

Bless the Lord, O my soul,

and all that is within me bless his holy name.

Organ Voluntary during the Distribution of Holy Communion.

It is customary to kneel throughout the distribution of Holy Communion except when going forward to receive the Blessed Sacrament and upon returning to your place.

<u>Prayer after Communion</u>

(STAND)

Let us pray.

And all pray in silence with the Priest for a while, unless the silence has just been observed.

May this divine sacrifice we have offered and received fill us with life, O Lord, we pray, so that bound to you in lasting charity, we may bear fruit that lasts for ever. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

All then pray:

Almighty God, we thank you for feeding us with the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Through him we offer you our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory. Amen.

(STAND)

THE CONCLUDING RITE

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Bow down for the blessing.

God, who from the death of sin raised you to new life in Christ, keep you from falling and set you in the presence of his glory; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, and the Son \mathbf{F} , and the Holy Spirit come down upon you and remain with you for ever. **Amen.**

Go in the peace of Christ.

Thanks be to God.

THE ANGELUS

Traditionally in the morning, at noon, and in the evening in memory of the Incarnation of the Son of God, the faithful say the following prayers, outside of Eastertide:
