


Welcome to the Parish Church where. after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist: the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42)

The lesson of this morning's parable is obvious to all, and yet it is perhaps as difficult to put into practice as it is obvious. To be in this world and not of it, to collect the necessary goods of this world by honest labour and yet remain detached from them, to possess but not be possessed by worldly riches, is an ideal to which our weak human nature responds very reluctantly.

Of course a large percentage of Christians do respond to the challenge faithfully. They earn and use the goods of this world, while at the same time they keep God's laws and earn wealth for heaven. Some renounce even the right, which is theirs, to possess the necessary things of this world, by taking on themselves the vows of religion. Thus they set themselves free to devote their whole time and energy to the service of God and neighbour. Others, and they are of necessity the more numerous, have to own the world's goods in order to provide for themselves and their dependants, but, while so doing, they never let their temporal possessions come between them and their God. To do this is not easy, but God's helping grace is always available to the willing heart.

There is still a third group: those who resemble the foolish man described in the parable. Like him they are so enmeshed and ensnared in their desire to collect good things for their earthly life, that they forget that at any moment they may have to leave this earth and all they possess in it. They may not have large barns or grain-bins bursting at the seams with the fruits of their fields or their market dealings, but they have allowed their possessions, large or small, to become the prison-houses of their hearts and thoughts. We might say that although having had a glimpse of the riches of heaven they chose earthly baubles instead of God. This has been the fate of foolish men and women in the past.

No one will be excluded from heaven because they lawfully possessed some of this world's wealth. But they will exclude themselves from eternal happiness if they let this world's wealth possess them to the exclusion of God. The fate of the rich man in the parable need not, and should not, be ours. We still have time to collect some treasure for heaven.

A Loop System is in operation at St Mary & St Giles - please set hearing aids to the "T" position.



Access for the Disabled at St Mary & St Giles is via the path on the north side of the church. At All Saints it is via the South Porch.



Gluten-Free Hosts: if you are on a Gluten-Free diet and would like a Gluten-Free Host when you receive Holy Communion please mention this before Mass to one of the Sides men or women who will arrange this for you. Please make yourself known to the Parish Priest so that he is aware of your need.



Collections: for the continuing mission of Christ are taken while the altar and gifts of bread and wine are being prepared. If you are a visitor and a taxpayer and would like to make a donation please use the Gift Aid envelopes provided at the end of each row - please fill in your details. This enables us to reclaim, from the Inland Revenue, 25p for each £1 donated.



We observe a period of quiet prayer and reflection before the celebration of Mass, between the end of the Organ Voluntary and the Sacristy Bell being rung, in order that we may be better prepared to worship almighty God.



Reception of Holy Communion: All Baptised and Confirmed Christians are encouraged to receive Holy Communion. If you are unwell or uncertain about receiving the Precious Blood please do still receive the Host. Our Chalice Assistants are not authorised to permit the intincting (dipping) of the Host.



Please join us at the back of church for tea or coffee after Mass. A priest will be near the main door shortly after the end of Mass should you need to talk with one.

'The Year of Mercy' - a Celebration in Oxford Cathedral: As you will no doubt know, the wider church is celebrating a Year of Mercy. Bishop Jonathan has been talking with the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral and they have welcomed the possibility of a celebration to mark the Holy Year on Saturday 17 September. The basic idea will be an opportunity to celebrate the Mass at Christ Church at 11 am followed by a picnic lunch and an early afternoon session of teaching and fellowship. Jane Hardy has kindly volunteered to organise a coach. Lists are available in each church for us to sign up to book a seat.

Proposed School Merger: As you are already aware, there is a proposal from Milton Keynes Council that St. Mary & St. Giles Junior School and Queen Eleanor Primary School should merge and become one school from 1st January 2017. This proposal has the support of both Governing Bodies, so the Council conducted an informal consultation with key stakeholders. That consultation resulted in the majority of respondents agreeing with the proposal which was then put as a formal recommendation to the Lead Member for schools, Councillor Zoe Nolan. (The papers for that meeting are available on the Council Website).

On Tuesday 28th June Councillor Nolan received that recommendation from the council officers and accepted it. Her decision means that the Council will now go to formal consultation in September for a four-week period - leading towards a final delegated decision by the lead member in November. During the formal consultation views and opinions will be sought from the public at large and we would welcome your contribution to that consideration.

It is our hope that the formal consultation will result in positive feedback from the public and a delegated decision to approve the merger so that our schools can merge on 1st January 2017. Signed,

The Annual Buckinghamshire Ride & Stride takes place on Saturday 10th September this year. With the weather warming up and the sun finally making an appearance, it isn't so hard to believe that a walk or cycle in the Buckinghamshire countryside in September might be a pleasant experience. We are looking forward to this year's event and already have plans in the pipeline to make 2016 a special year. Last year the sun shone and walkers and cyclists raised over £30,000 which will be used to help maintain the fabric of Buckinghamshire's historic churches. This year there are lots of different ways of taking part in the event, which has been running (or walking or riding) since its birth in Suffolk in 1982. We are hoping record numbers of people across Buckinghamshire will take part to make 2016 our most successful year ever.

PARISH NEWS AND NOTICES

Preparations for Ride & Stride 2016 are well under way. Since its inception it has been, and still remains, the principal fundraiser for the Bucks Historic Churches Trust. Over recent years there has been a gradual decline in participation and in funds raised. Although the sums are still impressive, we hope that in coming years we will be able to improve upon them. The number of churches in Buckinghamshire is truly awe inspiring, as are some of the efforts that have been made over the years to raise funds. We want to build on those successes, so this year – as well as continuing with the tried and tested formula – we will be testing a number of different ideas, and we are already working towards some more radical ideas in time for the 2017 event.

We are aware that other churches across Buckinghamshire take part in the Heritage Open Days scheme. HOD even has an icon in its literature to show that participating churches are also supporting Ride & Stride. So with a little planning it is very possible for both events to run happily alongside one another.

Mavis Wright has very kindly agreed to be our Parish Organiser this year. If you are willing to participate as a walker or cyclist please do have a word with her. Further details will be posted as they become available.

Reflection on the Lord's Prayer as recorded in St Matthew's Gospel (6: 9-13)

Central to the prayer of our Lord Jesus Christ was the 'Our Father', and it is on this universal prayer that we will focus in the coming weeks in a series of articles.

"Beware of practicing your piety before men in order to be seen by them; for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. "Thus, when you give alms, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by men. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. And when you pray, you must not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, that they may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. "And in praying do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard for their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. Pray then like this:

Our Father who art in heaven,
Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come.
Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those who trespass against us;
And lead us not into temptation,
But deliver us from evil.

As we can see St. Matthew records the Lord introducing the Lord's Prayer with a few warnings against false forms of prayer. Firstly it must not be an occasion for showing off before others. Rather prayer must have a discretion that is essential to the nature of love. We must be aware of God's personal love for each of us, but also realise that there is a community aspect to prayer. This is the very reason why the Lord's Prayer uses the plural "we" or "us" throughout. The second false from of prayer is the verbosity that can so easily smother the spirit.

Our relationship with God should not be momentary asking or thanksgiving, but should be present as the bedrock of our souls. Prayer really is being in silent inward communion with God. In a very real sense everything that happens in our lives should be related to the permanent presence of God with us.



The Our Father is always a prayer of Jesus, and communion with him is what opens up this prayer for us.. We pray to our Father in heaven whom we know through his Son. And that means that Jesus is always in the background during the petitions, as we will see more clearly as we go through the petitions in the weeks ahead.

2nd phrase: "Hallowed be thy Name"

Having addressed God as "Our Father" we then pray the first of the petitions of the 'The Lord's Prayer' asking that the name of our God be hallowed, reverenced, held in awe by all who see him as our Creator and loving Father - this is the meaning of 'the fear of the Lord' that is one of the seven-fold gifts of the Holy Spirit. 'Fear' in the scriptural sense has nothing to do with being afraid, but of honour, respect and wonder. The background to God's name is can be seen in the encounter Moses had with God in the burning bush. When Moses asked "Who are you" he was reflecting the concern of the Jews that their God should have a name, as had the false gods of the surrounding pagan tribes. God's answer to Moses was "I am who I am".

In answering in this way, God was declining to be named like the pagan gods all around his people. At the same time he was not refusing to give any name, but his answer made it clear to Moses and the people that he was the all powerful God, the only God, and incomparable to the false gods of their neighbours. This is the origin of the great reverence the Jews had for the name of God, and in fact they never uttered the name "I am who I am".


The Church understands God as giving a name – I am who I am – because a name establishes a relationship with another person. God's response was a statement of his infinite love for his people and his desire to care for them and protect them. So when we pray that his name will be hallowed we are recognising his presence with us and his eternal love for us, and asking that this relationship will grow stronger.

Perhaps we might also question our own attitude to the name of God, whether according to the Second Commandment we refrain from ever taking that name in vain. We ought also to consider whether our reverence for God's name includes Jesus Christ his Son, the Second Person of the Trinity - for far, far to often the Holy Name is uttered as an expletive in our age. Is our lack of respect for the name of Jesus a startling contradiction of our prayer "Hallowed be thy name"?

When we pray the Our Father, we must therefore pause and reflect on the deep historical reasons why we so respect the name of God, and examine the ways in which we abuse that name thoughtlessly so often.
