

Welcome to the Parish Church where, after the example of the early church, we celebrate the Eucharist:

the "apostles teaching and fellowship, the breaking of bread



Our divine Lord teaches us, in the Gospel this morning, the need for perseverance in prayer. This perseverance develops our trust and confidence in God. It helps us to become humble and to realise how weak we are when left to ourselves. It keeps us close to God, as we learn how dependent we are on His generosity. If we only would realise that God is perhaps never closer to us than when we think He is forgetting us! The trials of life, spiritual or temporal, which He allows us to suffer are not obstacles to our spiritual progress but rather stepping-stones without which we could not cross the rivers of life at all.

God wants every one of us in heaven but just as no two people on earth have the same identical features, so also no two people on earth have the same road to lead them to heaven. God is supervising the journey of each one of us. He is ever there to help if the obstacle on one's road is insurmountable. We may and we must, keep asking God for the spiritual and temporal favours which we know we need. We must never grow despondent or believe that God has lost interest in us, if He delays in granting these favours. When we shall look back on our earthly journey from the happy vantage point of heaven, we shall see how effectively and how lovingly God regulated our journey. When He did not grant a certain favour it was because He had a much more important one to give us, one we did not ask for or even realise we needed.

"Ask and you shall receive," not perhaps what you wanted, but what God knew you needed. "Seek and you shall find," not the easy way which you thought you deserved, but the harder way which would make you more deserving of heaven. "Knock and it shall be opened unto you," not the door you were standing at, which would have delayed or endangered your progress, but the door further down the street where refreshment and new courage to continue on your upward climb were awaiting you.



Vacancy for a Hall Caretaker/Booking Secretary: After four years of dedicated work Nicola Crompton has decided that it is time to hand over this role to another person. The Rector and Churchwardens are very grateful to her for all her hard work over this period and to Chris, who has been roped into assist regularly.

The Churchwardens, Louise and Kieran, are keen to appoint a successor and would be grateful if any who are interested in the position would see them as soon as possible. This post comes with a modest remuneration.

Heating at All Saints: The PCC met last Wednesday evening and considered the matter of the existing heating system at All Saints, which is very inefficient leaving the church cold in winter, which causes a quick rise in the air temperature leading to dangerous levels of condensation on electrical equipment, as well as the clergy having to wear extremely damp vestments.

Our Insurer's had previously forbidden the use of the 'tube heaters' in the pews, and have recently reiterated that warning. Our Insurer's have also said that the PCC should also consider the implication of any condensation/water vapour in the atmosphere being created by the existing system which can seriously damage the fabric of the building, particularly where it may assist with the early onset of rot in timber and corrosion of electrical installations including the organ which are most susceptible to fire risk where there is condensation.

It is the view of our architect that: the existing system is at the end of its useful life, and as there is dripping condensation it is a danger to those in the Church, given the potential for electrical faults. He pointed out that one of the major causes of fire in churches is poor and old electrical installations. He recommended that we urgently arrange to change the system.

The electrician who has done major work at All Saints over the past few years states that the existing system "is archaic, inefficient, and very expensive to run." He also agrees that the fact that it causes condensation is a fire risk, and in his opinion the system should be replaced. He also pointed out that the existing convector heaters at ceiling height "are well past their original intended service life." Research has shown that they are between 50 and 60 years of age.

It is the view of the Secretary to the Diocesan Committee for the Care of Churches that, given the professional advice of our architect, insurers, and electrician, the PCC should proceed as a matter of urgency to replace the existing system for the good of the building and for the sake of the people gathered for worship.

The PCC had already obtained a Faculty to replace the existing system with a much more efficient and economical system as designed by the foremost churches heating designer and our architect. Initially, the PCC had thought that there would not be sufficient funds available without the addition of grants and/or further fundraising. However, the project cost turned out to be less than originally expected, and there are sufficient funds, after the VAT has been claimed back upon completion of the work. This means that PCC could not apply for grants for this project as grant making bodies only give grants where sufficient funds are not available.

In terms of the cost and funds available this is the posi-

So ostensibly there is a shortfall of £3525. However, once the VAT (£5776) has been claimed back from the Inland Revenue the net cost of the project is £28,880 which will leave £2251 in the Restoration Fund. However, it needs to be noted that the PCC has to pay the VAT in the first place, and can only

claim it back upon completion of the work, and all bills are paid.

There is, understandably, concern that this leaves the Restoration Fund with only a small amount towards any emergencies. However, the PCC has decided to complete this project, and it has done so mindful of:

- the advice of professional people regarding the condition of the existing heating system
- the needs of the growing congregation at All Saints last Sunday there were five families with young children present
- the fact that this growth would be impeded by a church that is cold
- a desire to seek further monies for All Saints' Restoration Fund

The PCC has taken a step of faith in committing itself to this project's completion and in seeking additional donations/ fundraising to achieve a greater amount in All Saints' Restoration Fund. Prior to the PCC meeting offers of generous donations had already been received and since the PCC Meeting there has been an offer of a monthly donation towards the new system's running costs. If anyone wishes to make a donation or run a fundraising event to benefit All Saints Restoration Fund the PCC would be very grateful.

Other PCC News: as well as committing itself to the heating project at All Saints the PCC, at its meeting last Wednesday (a more fulsome report will follow next Sunday):

- Accepted a tender for works to the trees at St Mary & St
- Adopted the Criteria for an application for a Pioneer Minister's Post funded by the Archdeaconry
- Committed itself to form a Mission Action Plan to accompany the 'Criteria'
- Received Reports from the Rector on a number of meetings and a further one on the matter of the Rough Sleepers

Fr Benjamin Drury: having been in a new parish for some seven months, Fr Benjamin's new Incumbent, Fr James Wilkinson and the Bishop of Dorchester believe that he has now made sufficient progress in order that he may be ordained priest. The Ordination will take place at 5:00pm on Sunday 20th November in the Parish Church of St James, New Hinksey, Oxford. I have been invited to Concelebrate the Ordination Mass with Bishop Jonathan and Fr James, who has extended an invitation to those who wish to attend. In order to help him plan, he has asked that any who wish to attend let me know by Sunday 23rd October, in order that I can relay to him definite numbers attending. Fr Ross

#### The Works of Mercy...

The corporal works of mercy:

- (1) Feed the hungry.
- (2) Give drink to the thirstv.
- (3) Clothe the naked.
- (4) Shelter the homeless.
- (5) Visit those in prison.
- (6) Comfort the sick.

(7) Bury the dead.

We continue a series of brief articles considering these Corporal Works of Mercy Let us pray that we may be a merciful people.

#### Shelter the homeless

"The Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head" (Mt 8:20). Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, was born in a borrowed manger, had no fixed address once he began his public ministry, and was buried in another man's grave. It is guite an irony: He who made the universe became a homeless person.

The news makes us aware of the plight of millions of refugees driven from their homes by war, but homelessness is literally also right on our doorstep. Because the problem is perennial, there is a danger that, like the rich man in the parable, we no longer see the Lazarus we practically have to step over.

This corporal work of mercy forces us to open our eyes to the misery of those who, for a variety of reasons, have no place they can call home. We don't like to allow dogs or cats to stray on our streets, but we become numb to the fate of our own brothers and sisters.

Faith communities, make efforts to provide shelter for the homeless. These initiatives deserve our financial support and, if possible, our volunteer efforts. Along with providing a temporary roof over their heads, we need to help those homeless who are able to do so to get back on their feet and accompany them on the difficult path that leads to the dignity of being able to afford a place to stay. This can involve helping with job skills or offering employment. Whenever possible, we should give a hand up as well as a handout. We should also encourage efforts to provide for truly affordable housing.

Even as we grapple as a society and Church with the overarching challenge of homelessness, there still are those poor individuals we encounter every day who, like the Son of Man, have nowhere to lay their head. Some of them suffer from serious mental illness and are beyond the help of any but those with professional training. But a kind word, and a kind act, can brighten their day. As with the other works of mercy, sheltering the homeless requires discernment and the stewardship of our resources. Yet when in doubt, it is better to err on the side of charity. The patron of parish priests, St. John Vianney, was told that a beggar to whom he gave frequent assistance was in fact not poor at all; he answered, "You never lose when you give to

This work of mercy also invites to ask ourselves how hospitable we are. The Letter to the Hebrews urges us, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Heb 13:2). Sometimes it is easier to imagine that the stranger might be an angel than it is to see that someone in our own family or among acquaintances is

In short, this work of mercy can be summed up in the direct words of the Rule of St. Benedict: "Let all guests be received like Christ.
