# **REFLECTION - '25th Sunday in Ordinary Time'** "You go into the vineyard too"

The call to the vineyard (to the Church), through God's gift of faith and the sacrament of baptism, is a gift for which we can never sufficiently thank God. If we remain in the vineyard and labour earnestly, that is, if we cooperate with the actual graces God is continually giving us, we are assured of reaching heaven when our earthly days are ended. The work we have to do in God's vineyard is the fulfilling of the duties of our state in life. By carrying out these duties faithfully we are doing the will of God and preparing for heaven. The greater part of our day and indeed of our life, will be taken up with tasks of themselves worldly, but these tasks when done in the state of grace and with the intention of honouring God, have a supernatural value. For this we have to thank God for His goodness and generosity.

He could have made the attainment of heaven so much more difficult. He could have demanded extraordinary mortifications and renunciations and the reward (heaven) would still be exceedingly great. Instead He allows us to live our everyday life, to enjoy the love and friendship of our family and friends, to satisfy the natural desires of our bodies, within the commandments, and yet to merit a supernatural reward while so doing. As He tells us through St. Paul: "whether you eat or drink or whatever else you do, do all to the glory of God (1 Cor. 10: 31)."

Looking back on our past life, how many years have we really given to God since we came to the age of reason? Those school years, the time spent learning a trade or profession, the weeks, months, years working in an office or factory or farm, the hours among the pots and pans in the kitchen — have we served God faithfully in all of this, or has it all lacked the right intention?

If there was a poor intention then do not despair, we may have been "idle" all that time, but today's parable, should give us new hope and courage. It may be the sixth or the ninth or even the eleventh hour of our life but we can still serve God if we respond to his call and set to work diligently in His vineyard. If we put our conscience right with God today and resolve to be loyal to Him from now on He will be as generous to us, as the parable promises.



The PCC examined the accounts and was pleased to note that Planned Giving was up £2165 on the year to date ©

The PCC agreed to reappoint two School Governors for a further term of Office

The PCC noted that the Property Register still needed to be completed at All Saints.

In its discussion of Children's Ministry Matters the PCC agreed to the Diocese's recommendation of a change of companv for DBS checks, noted that the Children's Policy was up to date and received a school report from the Headteacher, Mr Salter,

The Rector reported that the Diocesan Sabbatical Committee and the Archdeacon had agreed that he should take a sabbatical next year. This will run from February 9th through to May 16th. The Rector also led a discussion with the PCC on a letter he was to write to the Bishop of Oxford regarding the proposed Mission Post for the Western Expansion Area in the Parish. Members agreed to pray and consider this and let him have their suggestions for inclusion in the letter by the end of this week. The Rector also reported that the Diocesan Board of Education was considering how it could best place a bid for the Secondary School on the Western Expansion Area to be a Coff School. The Rector also discussed with the PCC the latest developments at the recent meeting of the General Synod, and some of the issues arising from that with regard to pastoral care.

The PCC next meets on the 16th November at which meeting it will make arrangements for the Vestry and Annual Parochial Meetings to be held in 2018.

**Parochial Church Council News:** The PCC met on Wednesday evening of last week and the following matters were discussed/decided:

The last remaining report required for the Faculty Application for the recasting of the bells and the replacement of the bell-frame at All Saints had now been received. It was agreed that the Rector should consult with the Architect over the 'Statement of Significance' and the 'Statement of Need' that the PCC need to submit as part of the Faculty Application, and approval of these statements was devolved by the PCC to the All

Saints Fabric Committee.

The PCC noted that the Rector had highlighted the remaining items in the 'Greater Access Project at St Mary & St Giles in the Newsletter, and reiterated its hope that fundraising would make it possible for it to commission the disabled access and gallery extension, for which Faculty had been granted, in 2018.

The Church noticeboards for each of our Parish Churches had arrived, (the board at All Saints was erected yesterday lunchtime), and Messrs Odells had kindly agreed with the Rector to erect the board at St Mary & St Giles.

The removal of the moss at the lychgate at St Mary & St Giles requires it to be treated with mosskiller first. The Rector, Mr Salter and Mr Mullins agreed to attend to the erection of the component parts of the scaffolding tower to make this possible.

It was agreed that the Rector obtain quotations for a full survey and burial plan of All Saints Churchyard. The PCC expressed its gratitude to Mr Steve Thompson for his hard work in compiling the survey of the Churchyard at St Mary & St Giles.

Concern had been expressed at a previous meeting about the rusted pipes to the radiators in the chancel at St Mary & St Giles. A quotation had been received which suggested that both radiators needed to be replaced with what were essentially domestic radiators, as it was not possible simply to replace the pipes feeding the radiators. That quotation included the removal of 'all debris.' However, the Rector discovered that the Column Radiators such as those existing in the chancel were fetching over £549 each online, and in consultation with the Secretary to the DAC obtained advice from a reputed heating consultant free of charge. He informed the Rector that the existing radiators were fine and that any reputable plumber would be able to replace the pipes feeding the radiators. The DAC had subsequently advised that Reader at SMSG: Shirley Scrutton

# **PARISH NEWS & NOTICES**

Harvest Thanksgiving: today we observe Harvest Thanksgiving with the Parish Mass being at St Mary & St Giles, and with Evensong this evening at All Saints following which there will be a Bring & Share Supper and auction of produce.

This year we are extending this observance with the School holding it's annual Harvest Thanksgiving Mass in church on Friday on the Feast of the Archangels: Ss Michael, Gabriel & Raphael. Then next Sunday, while Sunday's in Ordinary Time, take precedence the 1st of October is the Feast of the Holy Guardian Angels. Harvest Thanksgiving is always observed around this time because of the link between the Harvest and the Scriptures foretelling the Angels involvement in the ingathering (the harvest) of souls at the end of time. To reflect this we shall be singing traditional Harvest Hymns this morning and at Evensong, and then next Sunday have a number of those wonderful hymns which relate the Church's teaching on the Angels and how they serve God and

Given this extended Harvest period, we have an opportunity to collect more tinned and packet foods for the MK Foodbank, which will be our Harvest Thanksgiving cause this year. Gifts may be brought to either of our Parish Churches.

Rosary Group (Walsingham Cell): The first meeting will take place this Friday 29th September at 2.00pm in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel at St Mary & St Giles. This day is also the Feast of SS. Michael, Gabriel and Raphael which makes it a really appropriate celebration to mark our first meeting. The group is for those who interested in learning how to pray the Mysteries of the Rosary and those who use this devotion regularly as part of their own prayer life. Spare rosar-

ies will be available for those who do not have their own but would like to explore praying the Rosary. It is hoped that there will be enough interest to form our own Walsingham Cell Group. Several people have asked about an evening group and this will take place on the first Tuesday of each month. The group will meet in the Rectory starting at 7.30pm. The first meeting will take place on Tuesday 3rd October. If anyone would like any further information then please speak to Sister Janet who will be leading both groups.

Weekend Pilgrimage to Walsingham 2018: The last three year's pilgrimages have brought many blessings to those who participated in them, and each year we seem to attract a number of 'First-Time Pilgrims,' which is a wonderful thing. We are now taking bookings for next year's Pilgrimage; the dates for which are: Friday 17th - Sunday 19th August. Booking Forms are available at the back of each of our Parish Churches.

Fr Ross will be giving a DVD Presentation on Walsingham. In the Parish Hall at 8:00pm on Tuesday 3rd October. If you have never been to Walsingham or simply want to enjoy a reminder of your own Pilgrimages then this is very much for you.

**Church Diaries 2018:** Once again the supplier of the Church Diaries we switched to last year has printed a large quantity of diaries for us.. As with last year we have sufficient for us to take copies away to give to family and friends. Copies are to be found in both our Parish Churches.

Greater Access Project at St Mary & St Giles: As previously reported the Chancellor granted the Faculty for the Disabled access, Gallery Extension, redecoration and new seating Project. While we were not at the stage of being able to

commission the work, we needed the Faculty in order to be able to apply for grants, as most grant-making bodies will not give grants unless projects have all the necessary approval. Now that the Pipe Organ Refurbishment is complete we shall be turning our efforts towards the much anticipated first phase of this project: the Disabled Access and Gallery Extension. Whilst we still need to raise monies towards the total cost (which is between £90,000 and £100,000) the PCC hopes, provided monies become available, to be able to commission this work next year.

The most expensive part of the whole project will be the redecoration of the Church - likely to cost over £100,000. -this includes insulation above the nave and chancel ceiling, which will help make the building warmer and improve the longevity of the redecoration of the ceiling. You may have noticed the square patterned effect that emerges over time on the ceiling (much more pronounced in the chancel - this is caused by local conditions: namely the high water table resulting in greater levels of damp. This damp penetrates the areas between the fretwork frame to which the plaster and lathe is affixed to leading to the darker square patches. The insulation should help prevent this occurring for a much greater period.

The final part of the project will be the reseating of the Nave with the light-oak chairs previously shown to everyone, and the stripping and restaining in light oak of the front of Nave Responds, now agreed as part of the Faculty Consent. The type of Chairs chosen are increasingly seen in Cathedrals and major Parish Churches, and are designed to cope with greater use and to last for at least a century. This part of the Project is unlikely to attract grants, and

so we shall need to start a special fund within the Parish Accounts for donations towards the new chairs and the proceeds of any specific fundraising efforts. To that end donations of the cost of a chair (approx. £245) or more than one in memory of a loved one will be one way in which we might be able to raise the funds - as their may be wider interest in having loved ones commemorated in this way from a wider area than the parish.

The Rector, Churchwardens and PCC would very much appreciate fundraising ideas and also to be informed of any grant-making organisations that you know of.

**All Saints & All Souls:** All Saints Day will be observed at All Saints Church at 7:30pm on Wednesday 1st November with a Sung Mass.

All Souls Day (Thursday 2nd November) will, as is customary have three celebrations of Mass: 9:30am Low Mass at St Mary & St Giles 11:00am Low Mass at All Saints 7:30pm Sung Mass at St Mary & St Giles
