

es out to heal that hurt.

It is all part of the revelation of the God who is love. He doesn't love faceless crowds but individual persons whom He meets face to face.

It is writ large in Scripture - the woman with the issue of blood, whose touch is felt amid the pressing of the crowd, the man by the pool of Siloam, the man with the withered hand, the cry of the man by the side of the road heard above the din of the crowd....

Our Lord loves every single one of us as though we were the only one in His Presence. He loves us because we are made in God's Image and destined to be His brothers and sisters.

And the colour of our skin, our ethnicity, our wealth or poverty, our power and our powerlessness....or as St Paul puts it " nothing in life, not even death can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Face to face..... that's why at the heart of every local community there must be a Parish Priest gathering the local Church to proclaim that truth loud and clear and ensuring that everyone knows it is addressed to them.

(I have known Fr Sam for many years, and he was inspired to write this whilst, on Easter Day this year, reflecting on the need for people to return to Public Worship, because he realised that the Lord doesn't deal with people via Zoom or Teams, but in person: face to face. It is in the Mass that we meet him in person as we open our hearts and lives to receive him under the veils of Bread and Wine in the Blessed Sacrament. It is in worship that we seek his mercy, his love, his healing and his grace. Many of us have been deprived for so long that we have forgotten just how much we need to meet with Jesus, and indeed just how much Jesus misses us. Fr Ross)



Archbishop Michael Ramsey of Canterbury on the Daily Office: "The point of the Daily Office is to root your prayer in the scriptures and in the Church's corporate prayer. The Daily Office in psalm and canticle and lection tells of God's historic revelation and redemption and of the response of the Church down the ages in praise and thanksgiving. We need to soak ourselves in this if our prayer is to be fully in Christ's name and to his glory, and one with the redeemed people of God. In the Daily Office we are lifted beyond the contemporary; and let us be sure that we will serve the contemporary scene effectively only if we are sometimes lifted beyond it, praying with the Church across the ages and with the communion of God's saints. We all experience times when the Daily Office is a burden; persevere, and you [will] find it less a burden than a wonderful liberation."



INFORMATION



Safeguarding: Our Parish Churches have adopted and follow the Diocese of Oxford's recommended policies for the safeguarding of children, young people and vulnerable adults. Details of these policies and of our Safeguarding Officers are available on the noticeboards inside each Parish Church. Should you have any safeguarding concerns then please see one of them.

Restrictions During the Current Pandemic:

Unfortunately, we are required to observe the following restrictions:

- ◆ **FACE MASKS: MUST BE WORN** by all attending worship as required by Law, apart from the Priest and any Lay Ministers assisting him. **N.B. IF YOU CANNOT WEAR A MASK FOR MEDICAL REASONS YOU MUST WEAR A FACE SHIELD.**
- ◆ Only 3 or 4 **Church Bells** are permitted to be rung, because ringing chambers are not large enough for distancing requirements when a full team is present. The Tower Captain and Assistant must keep a record of who is present to ring on what dates and ensure that distancing is maintained on the staircase. Bell ringing practice is not permitted.
- ◆ **Entry and exit** to our Parish Churches - entry via the West (Tower) Door and exit via the Parish Hall at St Mary & St Giles - entry via the South Porch and exit via the West (Tower) Door at All Saints
- ◆ There cannot be an **social gathering** in either of our Parish Churches before or after Mass - brief social intercourse may take place in the churchyards before or after Mass.
- ◆ 'Shared' **Mass cards** are not permitted. Please do not take a copy for someone else - either retain it for your devotions at home, or place it in the bin provided at the exit points in both churches.
- ◆ Until further notice all **communal singing**, singing rehearsals and concerts are prohibited in all places of worship. It is now possible to have a small choir and Organ Music played - a recessional hymn may be sung within in the churchyard.
- ◆ **Collections:** Cash donations and envelopes must be placed either in the large plinth donations box at St Mary & St Giles, or in the bowl by the south porch door at All Saints. We are not allowed to pass a collection plate/bag to one another.
- ◆ **'The Peace'** may not be shared physically. We may however join our own hands and bow to each other at The Peace, whilst saying the customary greeting.
- ◆ **When going forward to receive Holy Communion** - at St Mary & St Giles please approach centre of the altar rail in single file via the main aisle, observing a two metre distance, and return to your place via the side aisle. At All Saints: again single file two metres apart but keeping to the south porch side of the main aisle on approaching the altar rail and returning to your place on the vestry side. N.B. in both churches Holy Communion must be received whilst standing and please extend your arms as far as you are able. Textile kneelers and cushions have had to be removed.
- ◆ **'Receiving Holy Communion'** is in one kind, i.e. The Host. This must be received in the palms of our hands - not on the tongue.
- ◆ **Please maintain a two metre distance** from each other on approaching the altar rails and on leaving our churches after Mass.
- ◆ **Lavatory Facilities.** Strict hand-hygiene must be observed and hand-dryers only used. In the lavatory at each church there is a spray sanitiser and single use sanitising wipes for each user to wipe the seat, flush-handle, water taps, sink and door handle. Used wipes should be placed in the waste baskets provided.

All of these restrictions, whilst not what we would wish for, do not detract from the fact that we are able to receive the Lord in his Blessed Sacrament.

RAISE THE ROOF

The Rector will produce a list of the names so commemorated suitable to be framed and hung on a wall in the lobby outside the Parish Office for all to see.

As from this morning forms to donate tiles will be available in church. The forms contain space for the donation of individual tiles in memory of up to ten loved ones and the donation requested for each tile supplied and fitted is £4.99. The completed forms with cash or cheque (payable to 'The PCC of Stony Stratford with Calverton') donations can be handed to either Bob Scarff or Fr Ross. There is also the option of electronic transfer, as the PCC Bank Details are included on the form. You may also know of relations, friends and neighbours who would like to donate tiles in memory of a loved one - so please do take a form for them too.

Once the exterior works are complete, the PCC, when funds permit, wishes to complete the desk work to the east wall of the Parish Office; comprising a taller unit for the parish photocopier - with paper kept above it - space for the filing cabinet along with an extension to the desk. The Parish Office will then gradually become the office from which Parish Administration takes place.

Further Easing of Restrictions: It is likely that no final decision on the easing of COVID Restrictions will be made until the 14th June. Therefore, the following group activities and events must be understood to be 'subject to' those restrictions being eased.

Come and join us in The Parish Hall (or Parish Church if the Hall is still needed due to the building works) from 10:00am - 12:00noon for a hot drink and delicious homemade cake and great company. Do also stop off at the High Street door to see what's on offer on our stall full of interesting items. We hope to make the first Saturday of the month coffee morning a tradition once again.

We are planning to serve refreshments in The Parish Hall to the many visitors this event will bring. This Adam was plucked lifeless from the tree of the cross so that he could become the first fruit of the new creation. The fruit of this tree is now the bread that is broken, the body that is given, which we have received. This fruit brings life not death, it nourishes us and shapes us as we grow more into the likeness of the new man ready to share everlasting life.

The Sick List & Anniversaries of Death: I would be grateful if I could have an update on the condition of all those we are praying for on the Sick List, so that I am able to keep it as accurate as possible.

I shall be updating the Memorial Registers in both churches at the end of this month. If you desire that names be added, so that loved ones can be prayed for on the Anniversary of their Deaths do please let me know their full name and the date of their deaths. Thank you. Fr Ross

Donate a Tile in Memory of a Loved One: Unfortunately, it has become clear that all the roof tiles on roofs of the Sacristy and the Parish Office will need to be replaced. It is not quite clear how and when this happened, but the 'lugs' that hold the tiles on the batons have worn away and, in addition, at some point the tiles became 'fired on' - which may have happened in one of two ways. Either the fire in 1964 caused the tiles to adhere to one another, or, to reduce the cost of replacing the roof tiles after the fire, the tiles were heated so that they adhered to one another. The budget had allowed for up to 60% of the tiles to be replaced, as would normally be expected, but unfortunately none of the present tiles can be used again.

We are attempting to seek additional grants, but that may prove difficult. Therefore, it has been suggested that we seek donations per tile in memory of a loved one.

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

*The Gifts of Bread and Wine are placed upon the altar, as the Cantor sings the **Offertory Antiphon:***

O lighten mine eyes, that I sleep not in death; lest say mine enemies, "We have prevailed against him."

Then priest says the Offertory Prayers to which the people respond:
Blessed be God for ever.

(STAND) Pray brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.
May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands

for the praise and glory of his name,
for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

The priest says the Prayer over the Offerings:

Look kindly upon our service, O Lord, we pray, that what we offer may be an acceptable oblation to you and lead us to grow in charity. Through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you
and also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The priest sings a Eucharistic Preface appropriate to the celebration, after which all join in the acclamation: (KNEEL)

**Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.**

The priest continues the Eucharistic Prayer of thanksgiving, recalling the command of Jesus Christ, 'Do this in memory of me.'

Priest: The mystery of faith:

**All: We proclaim your Death, O Lord,
and profess your Resurrection
until you come again.**

The Eucharistic Prayer continues with the priest interceding for the Church, the world, all those present at this celebration, and the Faithful Departed. At the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer all join in the Great Amen.

Priest:for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

THE COMMUNION RITE

The Lord's Prayer

The priest introduces the Lord's Prayer.

(STAND)

**Our Father,
who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name;
thy kingdom come;
thy will be done;
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation;
but deliver us from evil.**

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you, look not on our sins, but on the faith of your Church, and graciously grant her peace and unity in accordance with your will. Who live and reign for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The peace of the Lord be with you always.

And also with you.

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

The Agnus Dei

(KNEEL)

**Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world,
have mercy on us.**

The priest shows the consecrated Host to the people, saying:

Behold the Lamb of God,
behold him who takes away the sin of the world.
Blessed are those who are called

but only say the word, and I shall be healed.**

The Communion Antiphon is sung by the Cantor and the people come forward to receive the Blessed Sacrament.
